President's Report





In 2020 the ELCA celebrated the 50th anniversary of U.S. Lutheran churches' decision to ordain women. This celebration continues through the work and witness of our church — and of the Lutheran World Federation (LWF) — for gender justice and women's empowerment. We give thanks for the LWF's steadfast commitment to the ordination of women into pastoral ministry as a calling of God and a gift to Christ's church.

Let us pause this Sunday to reflect, rejoice and recommit ourselves to accompanying each other in the challenges and joys along the way. Sally, we pray for you especially. Now and always may God bless and keep you — and, through your ministry, all whom you are called to serve.

Highlight's from Church Council - January

REPORTS:

• Treasurer's Report: Kay presented December's financial report showing plate contributions at \$15,748.80 and total monthly income of \$16,374.07. Expenses for the month were \$15,596.05. Major expenses include insurance set-aside, repair set-aside, large music expenses for Christmas and \$821.92 for supply pastors. The checking account balance is \$9,029.22. January should show a reduction in pastoral expenses.

• Committee Reports:

- Worship Committee- See newsletter for further. The suggestion to make Dan Callahan lead of technology was presented to council. A motion was made and unanimously approved, with one change, that he will be the leader of a technology team. Neal Booth will serve as one of the members representing Council.
- Community Garden Team- Mark Groh was in attendance to explain the needs to start the community garden and to seek specific donations (not just monetary) from the congregation. He mentioned that a major expense would be running a water line. A motion to initiate donations from the congregation was made and passed. Discussion of funding needed is a \$3,500 draft budget. Grant options and Thrivent can used as funding resources. Costs for installing a water line with hydrant are less than originally predicted with volunteers Rich Kelley and Gary Neese doing construction. The idea of a separate shed has been eliminated as the current garage has sufficient room. A Blessing Box will be constructed for sharing produce and canned goods. Alton Crisis Food Center is expected to receive the bulk of produce. Signage options are still being explored. 12 5x10 plots are ready for spring planting thanks to David Isringhausen and his nephew. A final decision on vegetables to be planted will be made next meeting. The Alton High FAA may have an interest in helping. Members from hunger-focused organizations will be invited to participate in planning

DISCUSSION ITEMS:

- New Directory- Per a conversation with Janet Broche, the project is on track for February distribution.
- Annual Report- Janet Broche is waiting for a few individual committee reports to complete the annual report.
- Tiemann Memorial- Jim has spoken to Fred Tiemann. Fred wants some of Bonnie's memorial contributions to be used for a matching stone bench. The cost will be around \$2,200+. Fred will donate \$1,250. He would like the memorial fund to donate what was collected in Bonnie's name up to \$1,250. If there is a remaining balance, he would like the church to pay. A motion was made and passed to move forward on the bench.
- Church Secretary- Pay for the secretary is twice a month and is calculated by the hours worked. This begun in January, 2023.
- Counters for Collections- Jim advised that there are three new counters that are not council members to assist.
- Envelopes- Kay stated that they are still on back order. The company is possibly looking at a shipping date in February but uncertain.
- A/V Update- Output Unlimited states that supply issues remain the reasoning behind delays. Council would like to see some progress with this project; possibly running the wires/cables if nothing else. 75% of the total cost of this project has been paid with nothing in return 7 months later. Jim has agreed to contact Output Unlimited with some persuasive pressure.
- Ministry Site Profile- There was an unanswered question on the profile regarding same sex pastors. We discussed pros and cons of this issue. Some of the pros were having a larger pool of candidates, open and affirming, bringing new people in the church. Cons were mostly about losing members. After much discussion a motion was made by Jim to answer that our church would be open to engage candidates that were of the same sex. The motion was seconded by Robin and passed.

- Music Fund Request- Discussion was lengthy on what is needed and what budget is correct. The budget was tabled until next meeting. A request to donate furniture was also made. A motion was made and passed to accept the gift of furniture from Dr. Harvey Chiles. Other items were tabled as there is a meeting scheduled with Dr. Chiles on Sunday, January 22. Conversations are ongoing.
- Selection of Interim Pastor Jim has been talking to several supply pastors regarding either Full or Part-Time permanent positions here. Discussion involved budget savings (supply vs interim), work load of the church secretary, possible increase of church members, etc. In talking to Jan Worms, Jan said she would be honored to be considered. A motion was made to extend an offer of three months to her, working 1 day a week in the Church Office and Sundays, for February, March, April as stipulated by the synod.
- Approval of New Financial Secretary Beth Hoffman is no longer able to hold this position. Karen Woods has volunteered. A motion was passed and accepted. Thank you Karen for your assistance.
- Church Sign/Marquee Pastor Hoffman's name will be taken off the sign.
- Changing our Church Email- rlcelca@att.net needs to be updated. The church no longer has an AT&T account and technically the e-mail could be shut down/taken away at any given time. Furthermore, that account has been very problematic for those using it. Dan Callahan will be establishing a new email and facilitating Outlook on the church computers. Details to be announced.
