

We are an inviting community of faith where we care for all.



John 8:36 is one of the most inspirational phrases in all of Scripture. So if the Son sets you free, you will be free indeed. While sin enslaves us, true freedom is found only in Christ. Sin deceives by promising freedom, when all it does is control and corrupt us. Those who don't have faith in Christ are bound by sin, and subject not only to slavery, but to spiritual death. Those who find Christ, the one and only source of spiritual truth, will be "truly" free.

"And you shall know the truth, and the truth shall set you free."

Did you realize that this common verse about freedom is being used by both Christians and non-Christian individuals? Even more interesting is the fact that this specific verse is not just used by ordinary people, it has made its way into films, movies, tv shows, and other pop culture. However, most of the time, it's being used without having the proper understanding of its context.

So, what is this freedom being talked about? More importantly, how can we attain true freedom?

To fully understand the context of John 8:32, one needs to continue reading, especially John 8:36

"So if the Son sets you free, you will be free indeed."

The truth is, true freedom can only be found in Christ. Jesus Christ has always been God's answer to our loss of freedom. When Jesus began His ministry on earth. He announced that He was the one that God's people had been waiting for. He did so by reading a particular message from the book of Isaiah.

"and the scroll of the prophet Isaiah was handed to him. Unrolling it, he found the place where it is written: "The Spirit of the Lord is on me, because he has anointed me to proclaim good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim freedom for the prisoners and recovery of sight for the blind, to set the oppressed free, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor." Then he rolled up the scroll, gave it back to the attendant and sat down. The eyes of everyone in the synagogue were fastened on him. He began by saying to them, "Today this scripture is fulfilled in your hearing." Luke 4:17-21

In the last verse of this passage, Jesus Himself confirms how the Scripture is being fulfilled in their midst through Him. He is the Messiah that the people are waiting for, the one that will free all of humanity from the bondage of sin. He is a manifestation of freedom Himself.

Without Jesus, without accepting Him as our Lord and personal Savior, we can never attain true freedom. Yes, we might experience different kinds of freedom, religious, social, and political to name a few, but these are only worldly. Without Jesus, we will always be doomed to experience chaos, disorder, injustice, and more.

As God's people, we should always seek Christ to experience freedom from all things chaotic - - freedom from the things that will keep us away from Him. Happy 4th of July!





Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

During the Sundays of June we've heard readings from Saint Matthew's Gospel, chapter ten. We've been reminded that as followers of Jesus, we are called to be disciples and called to make disciples. We're reminded that a primary way for us to do this is by how we respond to others. Through our words and by what we do, others see Jesus in us. What we do, what we say, how we act – it matters! When I've taught confirmation, I frequently discuss with my confirmands that if they say they follow Jesus, it should show in our daily lives. Each one of us crosses paths daily with friends, family, and strangers. Many of them are hungry for a word of hope. Many of them would be eager to receive a small gesture of kindness. In our broken and hurting world, a world filled with separation, estrangement and despair, you and I are called to be the face of Jesus. God will go with us and guide us as we do this. May God continue to grant you grace and courage to proclaim Jesus to others.

Comments welcome! Several of you have expressed appreciation for our return to distribution both elements of Holy Communion and have welcomed the work of our Assisting Ministers and our Ushers. Worship is feeling more and more as it was before COVID.

We're still tweaking how we distribute the Holy Eucharist and will be trying something new the next few Sundays. The worship/communion assistants are working to learn how much to prepare --- how many hosts and individual cups do we use. This is helpful to eliminate waste, yet to make sure we have enough ready for all. To help us with that, the next few weeks, perhaps all of July, we will be distributing the Holy Eucharist by "tables." What this means is that the ushers will invite you forward to stand in front of the Altar in a semi-circle – actually more of an oval or curved line. Eight-ten folks will come forward at a time. I will begin distributing the host at one end of the line. The Communion Assistants and Assisting Minister will follow with the chalice for those who prefer to receive by intinction, followed by one of them carrying the tray of individual cups, and coming at the end, the Assisting Minister with a basket to receive your used individual cup.

Last week we began using Setting Ten, which is a hymn-based setting of the Holy Eucharist. The hymns are familiar, and you should have no trouble joining along during the liturgy. We will use Setting Ten until the Sunday after Labor Day.

Please let me or any member of the Worship Committee or Council know your thoughts and comments about our worship.

Our new Music Director, Russ Henkhaus, has been a bright spot and a most welcome addition to our worship. We are greatly blessed to have him serve us!

"Dwelling in the Word" continues during July. We meet every Monday at 2:00 P.M. Please join us anytime!

To each and all of you, a relaxing, enjoyable and restful Summer from me and my little grey cat Lilly.

What causes Hunger? Many factors contribute, consider a local response in the letter from Nick Kessinger, Director, Crisis Food Center (next page). Climate change is the greatest environmental challenge the world has ever faced, and it is damaging food and water security in significant ways, like drought and flooding. Lutherans Restoring Creation offers a great deal of information to support this on their website, as well as resources for suggested action for churches and individuals. Changing weather patterns and natural disasters destroy crops, limit what crops can be grown in certain areas, and reduce access to grazing land for animals. Climate change is also shrinking water supplies. All one needs to do is listen to any news channel, social media feed, or other source of local, national or global news to confirm these statements. Please register for the Lutheran Disaster Relief Zoom Call on July 25th at 7 pm to learn what we can do to help.

What is Hidden Hunger? In the U.S. those facing poverty often experience "hidden hunger," meaning even if they are getting enough *quantity* of food, the *quality* of food – vitamins and minerals – is lacking. Hidden hunger can stunt physical growth and cause poor cognitive function, weakened immune systems, and chronic diseases at later age.

If you know an elderly friend or relative who many need financial assistance with purchasing food, considering referring them to the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP). Go to the local Illinois Department of Human Services office (Family Community Resource Center), or mail or fax the application, or apply online at abe.illinois.gov the State of Illinois' official website to apply for and manage Medical, SNAP and Cash benefits. There will be an interview (can be on the phone). Document your identification, residency, immigration status, household income, resources, expenses, etc. The maximum net income for a family of one for 2023 is \$19,800. See the website for more eligibility information. Sharon Groh can help with questions or assist in the process, if needed.







Thank you for allowing me to take a moment of your time. My name is Nick Kessinger, and I serve as the director of Crisis Food Center located in Alton, Illinois. I wanted to take a moment to share a little bit about our agency. More and more individuals within the Metro-East are struggling with food insecurity as the cost of living continues to rise. As a current pastor and former youth pastor, I know the challenges of wanting to help those in need. This is where we come in.

Since we are not a USDA food bank, we provide to everyone who comes to us for food, regardless of zip-code, or any other factor. Working families who often "fall in the cracks," and make just enough to disqualify them for assistance elsewhere, can come to us for food. As our founder Francis Jackson said, "If clients are willing to come to us for food, we are going to serve them." Individuals can come twice a month, and receive approximately five to seven days of free food. We are open for food distribution Monday through Friday. Individuals are asked to call and schedule an appointment the day they would like to pick up food. We operate a hybrid model, meaning our client boxes are a combination of choice and pre-boxed items based on family size. Upon arrival, they are given a list of choice items that are then added to their box. Last month we served just shy of 650 families and anticipate serving over 700 families (approximately 2,000 individuals) next month.

As far as food acquisition, we pick up bakery, produce, and meat items at two local Schnucks stores Monday through Friday. We are an Operation Food Search and St. Louis Foodbank partner, so we can receive donated food or purchase food at discounted prices from St. Louis Foodbank when available. Since we are not a USDA partnered agency, we do have to purchase the majority of our food, and have been able to do so, thanks to generous individual donors, businesses, and churches within the Metro-East area. I hope this has given you a better idea as to our mission as we seek to partner with your church and other Metro-East nonprofits in making a difference in the lives of others.

Youth Programs


- The last game of the season for the Resurrection sponsored girls' softball takes place on July 6, 6pm at Glazebrook Park.

Highlight's from Church Council - May and June

REPORTS:

- Treasurer's Report May: Total offering for the month of May was down. Our total was \$9,306.47. Total income was \$9,621.77. Total expenses for the month were \$10,600.80. This included \$625.00 for mowing services. \$10,000 was moved from the checking account into reserve funds to gain more interest.
- Pastor's Report: Pastor commented on how change continues. We have added/restored Assisting Ministers, created new roles for Communion, returned to passing the offering plate, returned to sharing the Peace, returned to receiving Holy Communion. All changes have been received well. Past Jan will also be showing us how change can be accomplished by trying something new. The music during distribution will be meditative the 2nd Sunday of the month and a hymn the rest of the Sundays. Portions of the liturgy that are currently chanted will be spoken as we begin using Setting 10 for our Eucharist Liturgy. We will return to our usual setting after Labor Day. Distribution of Holy Communion will be done in "tables (where 8-10 people come up to the alter)" beginning the first Sunday of July. We will try this for several weeks and evaluate on a preferred method.
- **President's Report:** Jim mentioned selecting a Sunday in July to help Brayden Broche collect for a worthy cause. A date and cause to be announced.
- **Committee Reports:** There were no committee reports shared with council other than the Social Committee events and insight seen throughout the newsletter. A few members from the Audit Committee will be pulled together, pick a date in July, and meet at Kay Tucker's house to complete the task. The date/time for this to be determined.

DISCUSSION ITEMS:

- Insurance: Last year, our building insurance was changed to Church Mutual at the request of Pastor Len. Insurance has increased about 20% over the past year. Customer Service with Church Mutal has been lifeless and really only handled through back and forth emails. Kay met with our previous provider, Brotherhood Mutual and was shown some policy changes that made more sense than our current policy. For nearly the same yearly cost, council voted to return to Brotherhood Mutual where customer service and a real person have been just a phone call away.
- Memorials: A general discussion took place about how/when to use memorial money. Things like rebuilding the bridge and the Intention Cross were mentioned. We usually keep the funds on hand for about 1 year. Also, a new bench in honor of Bonnie Tiemann should be delivered soon, giving us
 Council is proposing that the Tiemann benches be moved out to the landscape along the drive where the new prayer cross will be placed once constructed and completed. These benches will provide a place for one to meditate and pray if so desired.
- Memorial Flowers: A discussion was held on whether we should provide flowers from the church when a member passes. It was decided to table this discussion until fall.
- Young Hall Windows: Jim mentioned that the curved windows in Young Hall look cracked. We are uncertain if this is the tint film or another issue. Jim will contact the Men's Club for input on replacing the 4 curved windows.
- Pictorial Directory: Its coming, but very slowly. We will continue to be patient with this large undertaking.

DISCUSSION ITMES CONTINUED:

- Website/Media: A request for easier access to the monthly calendar was made of Neal Booth. It has always been found online in the newsletter, but can quickly be found on the website under "Get Involved Events." Neal brought up concerns with our rather lifeless Facebook page that is seeing absolutely no activity or involvement. Council agreed that ending services with Christine Simone, hired under Pastor Len's duration, to handle our Facebook page would be looked into. Pastor Jan has agreed to take over the FB page and tap into some new resources she feels are worthy of sharing. A vote will be made after we review the terms of her contract.
- Office equipment: New cabinets were purchased for the Sacristy and assembled by the Callahans. The Callahans did a little spring cleaning and reorganizing. Thank you, Dan and Carol. New phones for the church office will be purchased at a nominal fee. The old ones just don't program properly. And those using them the most are tried to trying to make them work.
- Extending pastor's contract: Council unanimously voted to extend the contract for Pastor Worms which expired in July for another 6 months. She accepted and we are thrilled to keep her on board.
- **Meetings:** Jim mentioned holding a Stewardship drive this year rather than just sticking a pledge card in the mail. Our next quarterly meeting will also take place in August. Stay tuned for dates on both of these. Both will follow church services.
