Pastor's Pen- September

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

September holds at least two important dates for us at Resurrection. Well, at least one important date. The other date is in October.

Sunday, September 10, is "God's Work, Our Hands" Sunday. We have service projects planned that include cookies and fruit. You can read about those in Sharon's article elsewhere in this newsletter. During worship that day we will use resources prepared by the ELCA Division for Worship, including a special hymn for this day that was commissioned by the ELCA two years ago.

The second date is Sunday, October 1, which is "Blessing of our Pets" day. During worship we will sing hymns that focus on animals and creation. Animals and pets are such an important part of many of our lives and families. We treasure them almost as if they are our children. They are certainly a precious part of God's good creation and it is appropriate that we set aside a time to honor them and ask God's blessing upon them.

At the close of service, during the recessional hymn, we will gather in our entrance area. We will hear a few scripture passages, say a few prayers and then I will bless any pets present. You are most welcome to bring your pet to church. It should be well behaved and, in a carrier, or on a leash at all times. If your pet would consider it a blessing to NOT be present, please bring a photo of your pet for a blessing. A photo on your phone is perfectly fine. No pet? Not a problem.

The pet blessing this year is "planting a seed" for a day that could become a larger celebration in future years. We could add a hot dog lunch, pet parade, pet and partner fun walk around our ground, a demonstration from one of the Alton K9 teams, pet treats, and the list goes on. This can become as big of a celebration day for our community as you would like for it to be.

We celebrate the Blessing of Pets on the day nearest to October 4, which is the day we honor St. Francis of Assisi.



Here is a wonderful article by Angelo Stagnaro from "The US Catholic."

Every year, like clockwork, my dogs receive a blessing on October 4, the feast of St. Francis of Assisi. The warranty on the blessing doesn't wear out, but I don't want to take any chances on any of my charges. Neither do my fellow parishioners, as the Blessing of the Animals is a big deal in our parish. Everyone seemingly has a critter dependent upon him or her.

This year my parish welcomed a huge collection of cats in crates, dogs on leashes, and hamsters as far as the eye could see. And for those paying particularly close attention, there was one lonely snail named Gary, after a character on *SpongeBob SquarePants*. There were enormous dogs that could have easily been mistaken for not-so-small horses and tiny teacup varieties that could have fit four to a saucer, all eagerly awaiting their annual blessing.

The blessing also attracted a clowder of cats, a bale of turtles, a knot of snakes, a company of parrots, a horde of hamsters, a group of guinea pigs, and a glint of goldfish blissfully adrift in their fishbowl. Several police officers mounted on their trusty steeds towered over the assembled crowd, dutifully waiting their turn. After all, the horses need a blessing, too.

The dogs were curious and the cats were cautious, but there were no reported instances of interspecies violence. After all, St. Francis represents peace and balance in the environment. He composed the "Canticle of the Creatures," tamed wolves, preached to birds, and sought solace in the countryside. He once gave up his bed so a donkey could rest instead. It's natural that we, as believing Christians, ask for his protection over the furry, scaled, and feathered loved ones in our families.

For St. Francis, every creature—that is, everything that God created—was sacred. The sun, the moon, birds, humans, butterflies, and even rabid wolves were a part of God's plan and a sign of God's love. German philosopher Max Scheler once commented on St. Francis' love of creation by saying, "Where the modern cynic sees something 'buglike' in everything that exists, St. Francis saw even in a bug the sacredness of life."

The Christian custom of pet blessings originated from early Christians who lived close to the soil and nature. They were farmers whose livelihoods depended upon the health of their animals. Thus, early Christians would seek out the desert fathers to bless their charges. That's why Italian Christians have their animals blessed twice a year, once on St. Francis of Assisi's feast day and again on January 17, the feast of St. Anthony of Egypt—the monk who established the Christian monastic tradition.

The blessing of the animals is one of the few Christian celebrations that transcends denominational boundaries. Lutherans, Episcopalians, and Presbyterians, among other Christians, participate in the festivities. Jewish communities, too, will often bless their farm and companion animals during a ceremony known as the Simchat Noach. The latter custom didn't extend to or influence the Catholic community but rather existed alongside it.

Such a large collection of animals assembled in a church parking lot serves not only the pets but also serves as a community-building experience for their owners. In addition to our own pets, pet owners love other pet owners. And let's not forget that the sight of such a large assemblage of creatures serves as great advertising to the wider community that the church is thriving and relevant in an otherwise disjointed and impersonal era.

Pets expand the lives of their owners. While in their presence, we feel comforted, safe, secure, and loved. We, in turn, are given those beautiful, precious moments of God's overpowering grace with them to show we can love. In their simple state, my *ca de bou* mastiffs prompt me to remember to be kind, patient, and generous.

In his commentary on the Song of Songs, St. Bernard of Clairvaux admits, "I have seen a fraction of [God's] glory and it is awesome." Having dogs in my life, I can honestly say I've seen a fraction of God's love in their eyes. If God loves me with even a fraction of the love I have for my dogs, I know he truly, completely loves me. My dogs are blessed every year not only because of my concern for them but also from my gratefulness for having them in my life. It's a win-win.





They concentrate their collaborative, holistic efforts on children, youth and families who've experienced trauma, most often due to violence, addiction, poverty, and homelessness. Donations of craft items for art therapy, prayer shawls/ blankets (therapeutic support), plush toys (therapeutic support), personal care items and water have been delivered. Tammy Iskarous, Executive Director and Rachael Craddick, Fund Development Director will be guest presenters at an Adult Forum on 09/23/2023 at 8:45 a.m. Please mark your calendar to make plans to attend and show your support. The goal of the September 10th Resurrection Church ELCA 2023 day of service will be to have a churchwide event to include everyone. A Planning Team of Sharon Groh, Rich Kelley, and Pastor Jan agreed to recognize area family service organization staff with Cookie & Fruit trays in appreciation for their commitment to the families and individuals they serve. This is especially important for staff supporting families dealing with trauma and violence. A card with a faith-based message of encouragement, scripture and thank you will be included.

Details and Guidance:

- 1. A sign-up sheet is on the bulletin board in the coat room. It will be helpful to know how many cookies will be available, and fruit donations. Mandarins and grapes seem to last well. Cookies can be homemade or purchased.
- 2. Bring cookies and fruit to the church on Sunday, September 10^{th,} or place in one of the church freezers with a label "God's work. Our hands" if you need to bring them in early due to a schedule conflict.
- 3. Tray donations (Dollar Tree) will also be helpful.
- 4. We will plate the cookie and fruit trays following the 10:00 a.m. Worship Service for Sunday and Monday delivery. The number of trays depends upon donations. Delivery depends upon organization business hours.
- 5. Help is needed to write positive messages of encouragement and appreciation. Cards are available, thanks to the ongoing card ministry donations. The cards will be attached to the trays.
- 6. Potential service organizations include, but not limited to: Child Advocacy Center, Riverbend Family Ministries, Oasis Women's Center, YWCA Alton, Impact Center for Independent Living, Land of Lincoln Legal Aid, Community Hope Center Bethalto, and Riverbend Head Start. Let us know if you have an organization you want to see recognized.
- 7. The Faithful Innovation Team is coordinating with JoAnne Curvey, Principal at Gilson Brown Elementary School for a special staff surprise. Early Saturday, our Team, plus help from spouses, will decorate the staff lounge with garden fresh flowers, colorful signs of encouragement and appreciation, and leave trays of cookies, bars, baskets of fruit, and the Resurrection School Supply donations. It would be fun to see the reaction of the 36 staff members throughout the day on Monday.







Sharon Groh recently participated in a Lutheran Disaster Response (LDR) Zoom meeting sponsored by Lutherans Restoring Creation* to learn about the ELCA domestic and global efforts to collaborate with other disaster response organizations and religious entities in the United States and around the world. The LDR ministry provides both short- and long-term recovery when disasters strike by working with partners to develop responses that address local needs. LDR awards grants to partners, provides technical assistance, training opportunities and accompanies throughout relief and recovery stages.

Not long after the call, wildfires on the island of Maui occurred. We are thrilled Resurrection Council members voted to match up to \$500 in congregation donations to help support the Lutheran Disaster Response efforts. As we pray for the people of Hawaii and especially the victims of Maui, many ask "what can we do?" Lutheran Disaster Response is coordinating with the Pacifica Synod and other partners to assess the needs of people impacted by the wildfires. LDR will work with them to provide for immediate needs and long-term recovery amid the widespread destruction. Lutheran Disaster Response is communities in the years ahead. By standing with Maui's wildfire survivors, we follow Christ's call to share hope and healing with our neighbors in need.

The Resurrection Church community garden has been a tremendous success. We recently received a thank you card from the Alton Crisis Food Center expressing appreciation for the number of people who benefited from the fresh vegetables. Many individuals enjoyed having straight-from-the-garden tomatoes, cucumbers, eggplant, green beans, lettuce, squash, broccoli, cauliflower, and peppers added to their food boxes. Bob Doerr has planted an additional fall crop of vegetables. Garden maintenance continues. As a courtesy, Mark Groh has kept Mayors Goins and McCormick informed of our progress. Both have been supportive of the community project. The community garden will continue in 2024 with produce donated to the Alton Crisis Food Center and/or other community-based sources. There has been discussion of adding a Blessings Box if there are volunteers willing to take on the challenge.

Highlight's from Church Council – August

Our August Council Meeting ran from 7-10 pm. Highlights will be kept brief given the amount of content discussed. REPORTS

• **Treasurer's Report August:** Offering for July was \$11,289.97. Total income was \$11,776.35. Expenses for the month were \$11,979.40, leaving us \$203 short. Expenses were up due to paying our insurance. We typically set aside \$407 each month for insurance. With rates going up, we will need to increase that to roughly \$500. Output Unlimited was paid a 2nd installment of \$8,141. The final installment will follow delivery of the wireless mics.

• President's Report: The quarterly congregational meeting held on Aug. 13 was well received.

- Pastor's Report:
 - Pastor advised that Jim Wicklund was doing well after recent heart surgery.
 - The amendments to our church constitution that were voted on at the 2022 congregational meeting were sent to the Synod to be reviewed and accepted.
 - There is a need for additional Assisting Ministers, anyone willing to help out should contact Pastor.
 - Pastor briefly explained St. Luke's Feast Day, a day for blessing pets. Ideas to develop this into something larger next year were provided. For now, a simple service with well-behaved pets attending, will be held on Oct. 1.

- Upon Pastor's suggestion, council agreed that funds from the recycled books be donated to the St. Ambrose Outreach to support summer utility bills.
- The Community Garden wavier form that was shared at the quarterly meeting was discussed with attorney Nancy Larson, family of Pastor Jan. She advised that written waivers are easily overturned in court and that reaching out to our insurance company would be best for liability related issues. Kay followed up on this. An additional \$25 a year would cover us adequately. The Community Garden team was advised on 8/20 prior to tabling the idea on 8/21 after displeasure with council's stipulations.
- A follow up to preserving and caring for the wood in church was provided. Necessary supplies to be purchased to treat the "thirsty" wood.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

• Audit: Expenses and contribution records have been given to Bill Stoutenborough for review.

• Fellowship: Kay will talk with Carol regarding a dinner open to the community this fall . . . most likely to be a spaghetti dinner given the success of the first couple hosted prior to Covid.

• Social Ministry: Water will continue to be collected through the month of August. School is beginning and supplies are still needed. ELCA Disaster Fund for the Hawaiian fires is underway. The council agreed that our church should help by matching up to \$500 from the mission fund. Tammy made a motion to contribute matching funds. Kay seconded the motion. Motion passed.

• Finance: A meeting has been scheduled for September 25th, at the church at 4:00pm to discuss the budget. Attendees should be Pastor, Kay, Jim, Teresa, and John Droste. This meeting will include proposing a budget that will be presented to the council at the October meeting and scheduled for discussion before the congregation at the November congregational meeting.

• Worship: A location for the prayer cross has not been finalized. As a council, we took a walk outside and determined that the best place for the cross would be between the flagpole and the landscaping lights. Kay made a motion that the prayer cross should be built between the flagpole and the landscaping lights, not blocking the view of the electric sign. Alan seconded. Motion passed. Jim will inform the Men's Club to proceed with the project.

• Call Committee: The council was informed that a candidate was invited to become our pastor. But after consideration, the candidate declined. No update except that the work to find a candidate for our church continues.

• Men's Club: The annual chili supper drive thru is being planned. Discussion included the selling out of chili last year and more efficient ways to handle the cooking process. Currently all the cooking is done via crockpots ??? However, several large roasters capable of simmering temperatures are readily available and would speed up the process for producing more, with less cleanup.

DISCUSSION ITEMS:

•Clearwave Internet vs. Spectrum: We currently pay \$139 a month with Spectrum. Rates keep increasing. Clearwave Fiber is now in our area and will charge \$150 for 5 years with no increase. A motion was made by Neal to move our business to Clear Wave Fiber at the cost of \$150 for 5 years. The motion was seconded by Tammy. Motion passed.

• **Kitchen Floor:** Kay received a bid for replacing the bubbling kitchen floor with ceramic tile, but the bid as astronomical (\$7,000+). The adhesive under the old floor has never set properly due to moisture/humidity seeping through the concrete slap. In order to prepare for a new floor, the slab would have to be cleaned and sealed. Neal suggested looking into an epoxy floor. Kay will talk to the Property committee.

OTHER:

Special Meeting after church on August 20, 2023: Council meet briefly to vote on the Community Garden's proposal to rent plots to the public in 2024. In attendance were Jim Lieber, Tammy Neese, Kay Tucker, Neal Booth, Sherry Wyatt, Pastor Jan, and Teresa Droste. Kay emailed council earlier in the week with a quote of \$25 a year for liability insurance that they would be expected to cover. The vote stipulated that if the Community Garden initiative continues, and all conditions met, that Council would approve their request. Kay made that motion. Teresa seconded. Motion passed. For reference, the stipulation that the Community Garden rejected was selling 15 plots up front, cash in hand, before any tilling, fencing or work begun. The Community Garden tabled their idea, stating there wouldn't be enough revenue from renting 15 plots to cover their expenses.


