

President's Message

Hope, Peace, Joy and Love

We begin the season of Advent in anticipation of the birth of Christ celebrated on Christmas Day. The common symbol for Advent is the Advent wreath with four candles, or sometimes with a fifth central candle, called the Christ candle in the center, to be lighted on Christmas Eve.

The wreath actually began in a German (Prussian) Lutheran church as early as the 1600's, but gained greater popularity after Johann Wickern produced a wreath with four white candles and six red candles between each white to count down the days of the week before Christmas.

The ELCA in 1978 recommended 4 blue candles to represent hope during the Advent season, specifically, the hope of Jesus' second coming. Prophecy tells us that it will be a terrible time for all of mankind preceding his coming. The hope is in the establishment of His kingdom, of a new Jerusalem. In the meantime, let us look for and encourage hope, peace, joy and love here and now, best reached in sharing with others. Sharing our time, our caring, and our wealth with others, including not just family and friends, but strangers, the neglected and even our enemies. Respecting all individuals, who each have a soul and are God's creation. If we can do that, then there is indeed hope.




Adult Bible Study





Call Committee

In our last update we informed you about several staffing changes that were taking in place in our Central/ Southern Illinois Synod. As of September 23^{rd,} Rev. Greg Busboom was installed as the new Bishop. Additionally, our liaison, Pastor Ken Sandlin retired at the end of August.

Despite all the changes, we have good news to report. The new Assistant to the Bishop who also serves as our liaison for the call process, has been named. Pastor Amy Ziettlow joined the Synod staff on November 1, 2023. We have already been in phone contact with her to introduce ourselves. During conversation, she was asked about a visit with our Call Committee. Her response was not only did she want to meet Resurrection's Call Committee, but she also wants to meet the congregation.

To that end, Pastor Amy Ziettlow will be here on December 17th. The plan is for her to preach on that Sunday and then meet with the Call Committee. Please plan to attend and meet the Assistant to the Bishop and our synod liaison. This is an opportunity for us and our synod to become more connected.

We the Call Committee are looking forward to having a face to face conversation with Pastor Ziettlow and forming a more personal relationship. It is exciting that the Assistant to the Bishop wants to come to Resurrection. Thank you, Pastor Amy Ziettlow. Hope to see everyone on December 17th.

Highlight's from Church Council - Oct. & Nov.

REPORTS

- Treasurer's Report September: Expenses from September were down. A large contribution helped out. A down payment on the new epoxy kitchen floor was made. The church mortgage is now less than \$25,000 and expected to be paid off in August 2024, if all goes as planned. A contribution of approximately \$1,800 was made to help the victims in Maui with Council matching \$500 as promised from the Mission Fund.
- Treasurer's Report October: Total offering and income was \$10,891. We came in below budget compared to past Octobers. The cash flow balance was -\$341. We're holding our own and still in the black for the year. The checking account has roughly \$20,647 in it. \$5,000 of that will be moved to the money market account to earn interest. The remaining balance on the epoxy floor was paid. This project cost about \$2,500, resolved the issue of the buckling, loose linoleum and will be substantially more durable. If you haven't seen it yet, the finished result is most impressive and looks like terrazzo.
- President's Report: The Stewardship Committee is working on ideas pertaining to Ask, Think, Tell, the book that was used for Adult Study in 2022.

• Pastor's Report:

- Pastor announced that Resurrection was recognized as the best Lutheran Church in the area.
- Pastor and Russ worked diligently on the Veteran's Day Service. The service was well received and Pastor is suggesting that the Worship Committee consider purchasing advertising for next year, signage for our grounds and set a date (booking musicians, the VFW, etc. . .) to make this a yearly event.
- Our level of outreach has been rather noticeable for the past two months. We had Blessing of the Pets, the Chili Drive
 Thru and the Veteran's Day Service. We have more opportunities with Advent approaching. We have a good precedent and she would like to set a goal for one community outreach event at least every two months. A Spaghetti Supper is possibly in the works for early next year, but volunteers will need to commit to making that happen before further planning takes place.
- The Church Constitution, approved by Resurrection in 2022 is being reviewed by Pastor Richard Hertenstein and ready to be forwarded to the synod. No further action will be needed by the council or congregation.
- The Adult Study which started Nov. 5 has shown good interest. Pastor has a handout with choices for the next topic, to start in January. The next topic selected will be shared in the Jan. newsletter.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

- Audit: Bill Stoutenborough attended the October meeting and presented the Audit Committee findings. Several recommendations were made. Those will be reviewed by those involved and discussed in more depth at future meetings. A need for internal controls was stressed.
- Budget: The Budget Committee met prior to the October Council meeting. Their results were shared with Council, showing a deficit due to including the hiring of a permanent pastor. The final budget was presented and voted into place on Nov. 19 at the Congregational Meeting.
- Nominating: In October, Tim Belfield presented some people that may be willing to serve on the council next year. Three at-large voting members and a president are needed. Possible candidates were discussed. Those elected to serve will be Neal Booth, president, Vicki Baggio, Pat Ford & Wendy Reinbold, members at large. There was open spot for the Nominating Committee as well. Jim Lieber has accepted the position.

• Social:

- •Donations of craft items, personal care supplies and lap robes were delivered to Riverbend Family Ministries for distribution. Mark and Sharon attended the annual RFM banquet on Nov. 2.
- •Mark and Sharon are the only congregational members participating in the Graceful Nails ministry. Feedback remains positive and they will continue.
- •The November newsletter highlighted non-perishable food items to donate to the Alton Food Crisis Center. The barrel at the church has remained bare for most of the summer.
- •The volunteer-run Overnight Warming Locations have prepared for their 5th season of providing emergency shelter for the unhoused members on the coldest winter nights. Resurrection volunteers Mark and Sharon are encouraging others to consider helping.
- •At the request of members, a Winter Coat Drive and Giving Tree will be reinstated with details to follow.

DISCUSSION ITEMS:

- •Council approved the agenda for the Congregational Meeting that was held on November 19, 2023.
- Council had a brief discussion on having a Memorial for Sam Ellis for closure amongst Resurrection. Pastor suggested a brief addition to an upcoming service to spend some time remembering Sam and his parents (also members).
