

Your Christmas bonus gift to me was a lovely and thoughtful surprise. I am thankful and grateful to you! I've used part of it to purchase a new Alto Recorder with keys. I've loved recorders since 5th Grade when I was introduced to them by my music teacher, Miss Behrens. I own several and love each one of them. As I grow older, I find that my hands don't have the flexibility or the stretch that they had in the past. An instrument with keys will allow me to comfortably and safely continue my love affair with recorders. I purchased a Moellenhauer alto made in Fulda, Germany.

It is being shipped to me from Treppendorf, Germany from a family-owned company named Thomann, which is the largest music store in Europe. It requires six – eight weeks to "play in" a new wooden recorder. Failing to "play in" properly or rushing the process can cause the wood to crack. Just like a pipe organ, and my harp, my new recorder will not develop its mature "voice" for about two years. Just like another old saying, "Patience is a virtue," when it applies to a new wooden recorder. I'm anxiously following the progress of its shipment to me from Germany. I know that I will treasure this instrument and that it will always hold for me fond memories of you and your kindness to me.

For your calendar, please also note the we will install our new council during worship on January 14. Special thanks to our 2023 council, both those leaving the council and those who will continue to serve. Please share your appreciation with them. They have been a good council and wonderful to work with. And, please add our 2024 council to your prayers, that our gracious God may guide them and lead them as they work for us here at Resurrection.



Chili Success Story

The Men's Group of Resurrection Lutheran Church conducted their 5th Chili Drive-thru selling over 800 bowls of chili this year. The tickets for 2 bowls of chili were \$8.00. The customers had the option of rounding that up to \$10, with the extra \$2 going towards the Maui relief fund. The end result was nearly \$500 designated for Maui relief funds and the Men's Group matched that. \$1000 went to Lutheran Disaster Relief which administers the distribution to those in Maui who suffered from the fires.

This was truly a community event. The Telegraph told the story of the event to come and included the 3 Thursdays of chili sales in the "What's happening..." section of the newspaper. The chili was prepared in the church's kitchen over 6 different days. After the 3 days of sales, just a few bowls were left and they were quickly sold to members the following Sunday. FYI- The Organ

As some of you may already know and/or have literally heard, our church organ is ill and running on borrowed time!

Bottom line, it's 30 years old and has served its purpose. There are three issues, unknown if related to each other at this time. There is a failing circuit board causing fluctuations in the volume (possibly damaged from battery acid or the previous surge from lightening a few years back), a non-working pedal and only one of eight pre-recording options working at this time. A service call has already occurred with Steinway from St. Louis. We were advised to keep an eye on it for the time being. Council has agreed to seek a second opinion if one can be found... options for such services are far and few. We are not ready to shop and receive sticker shock yet, but know that this

could be coming at a substantial expense to Resurrection! Replacement over repairs will probably something we will be dealing with in the near future.



REPORTS

- Treasurer's Report September: November income was down compared to the previous two years. Total offering was \$9,109.41. Total income was \$9,317.50. Total expenses were \$11,833.88 for the month. The cash flow balance for the month was -\$2,516.38. We were able to get a refund for antivirus software that was charged on an autorenewal last month. Council has discovered a few services Pastor Hoffman purchased on auto renewal plans that the church simply does not need or want. There was an increase in office supplies due to the extra service for Veteran's Day as well.
- President's Report: Jim recapped recent events throughout the past month. The Giving/Angel Tree was a success with 22 tags taken by members the first Sunday they were displayed. We appreciate Jim's efforts in making sure this happened with the late start we got this year.

• Pastor's Report:

- January 7th will be the unhanging of the greens with a light lunch served.
- Installation of New Council will take place on January 14.
- Adult education will resume at 9am on Sunday, January 7. Conversation on exploring the Arab/
 Israeli Conflict will continue. In late January, Pastor will begin an 8-session study "Introduction
 to Islam." An out-of-print book accompanies the video. Used copies are available from Amazon, and other out-of-print resources. Anyone wishing to purchase the book should look for the
 title God Is One- The Way of Islam, by R Marston Speight. Copies have been seen as cheap as
 \$.96 on Amazon.
- Pastor has suggested that the Men's Club consider using some of their accumulated funds to purchase additional signage in the form of vinyl banners to display on the church property for seasonal services like lent, advent, vetran's etc.
- Our church organ is ill and running on borrowed time! Bottom line, it's 30 years old and has served its purpose. There are three issues, unknown if related to each other at this time. There is a failing circuit board (possibly damaged from battery acid), a non-working pedal and only one of eight pre-recording options working at this time. They were basically told to keep an eye on it, as the repairman seemed inexperienced and lacking knowledge on the issues. Council has agreed to hopefully track down a previous repairman used several years ago for a second opinion. Just know that replacement over repairs will probably be something Resurrection will be dealing with in the near future.

 mentioned earlier this past year. Pastor and Council are still in favor of the project. But, neither Council or the Men's Club have been able to come to terms on what this should look like given the fact that they are constructing/erecting it. A new location that would provide a reflection area open to the public with lighting and seating that will also enhance our landscaping has been introduced. Further to be announced as Neal and Dan take back the ideas and propose them.
