



Graceful Nails at Evergreen Place Supported Living continues.



## **Book Club**


Our April meeting will be held on **April 11**, with Sharon Groh as the discussion leader. Her book choice is **O Pioneers!** by Willa Cather. It is available at the library.

Summary: "O Pioneers!" introduces us to the Bergsons, a family of Swedish-American immigrants who live in the fictional farm town of Hanover, Nebraska at the beginning of the 20th century. The story centers on the life of Alexandra Bergson, who inherits the family farm with her mother and three brothers when her father dies. Many years of crop failures force the Bergson's neighbors to give up and sell their farms, something that Alexandra's brothers Oscar and Lou wish to do but which Alexandra and her mother are unwilling to do. Instead Alexandra convinces the family to mortgage their homestead in order to buy up the surrounding acreage. Amidst the backdrop of managing the farm there develops two romantic relationships in the novel, one between Alexandra and her childhood friend Carl Linstrum, who returns after many years away, and another between Alexandra's youngest brother, Emil, and the unhappily married Marie Shabata. "O Pioneers!" is a classic portrayal of the struggles of immigrants in the great plains of America, a story of success in the face of hardship, and the growth of a young woman along the way.



Karen Woods volunteered to be our leader for meeting on **May 9**<sup>th</sup>. Her book of choice is <u>All the Broken Places</u> by John Boyne. The book is available at the library.

Summary: All The Broken Places moves back and forth in time between Gretel's girlhood in Germany to present-day London as a woman whose life has been haunted by the past. Now, Gretel faces a similar crossroads to one she encountered long ago. Back then, she denied her own complicity, but now, faced with a chance to interrogate her guilt, grief and remorse, she can choose to save a young boy. If she does, she will be forced to reveal the secrets she has spent a lifetime protecting. This time, she can make a different choice than before—whatever the cost to herself....



We welcome anyone to come and join us, see and hear what an evening with us is like. Our group started in March of 2014 and we have achieved a lot of enjoyable hours of reading and great fellowship with each other.



# Highlight's from Church Council - March

#### **REPORTS**

- \* **Treasurer's Report:** Total offering for February was \$13,132.22. Lenten offering for the selected charities was \$380.00. Total income was \$13,311.94. Total expenses for February were \$11,068.26.
- \* President's Report: Neal requested Dan Garner to attend the March Council meeting to get a rundown of where the Men's Club is with the upcoming events. Council wants to offer full support to maximize outreach with these golden opportunities to witness and show outreach to the community. Neal made a motion to purchase an outdoor banner, up to \$100, to advertise the Cars, Coffee & Community. This banner will be on display throughout the summer. Motion passed unanimously. Neal is also orchestrating with Dan on ways to get the word out to the community, including flyers that the congregation can take home and share with their neighbors.

#### \* Pastor's Report:

- A 2<sup>nd</sup> wood-care day has been scheduled for April 14 after worship. Many hands make light work. The wood-care process this past fall took about 30 minutes thanks to all the helpers.
- Pastor is arranging a trip to the Daar-ul-Islam Mosque in Ballwin to correlate with the adult study on the Islamic religion. Lunch at a Halal restaurant will happen before or after the tour. Stay tuned for more details.
- The idea of a "Second Sunday Lunch Bunch" that would meet for lunch/brunch the 2<sup>nd</sup> Sunday after worship was presented. Several members of Council advised such a group existed pre Covid and it would be great to return that kind of fellowship return. Dates to be determined after Easter.

#### **COMMITTEE REPORTS**

\* Men's Club: Dan shared with Council his agenda for the Concert. The genere of music has changed from easy listening and classic rock to show-tunes. Programs with advertising opportunities/sponsors will be assembled for the Concert. There will be a meet and greet with refreshments following the concert. Dan also shared some preliminary steps already being taken for the Cars, Coffee & Community events. On Council's advice, pens advertising Resurrection were purchased. Grab bags with goodies was being looked into. Advertising for all events is being handled by Bill Stoutenborough and Dan via Facebook with various local car clubs. The Men's Group is also sponsoring a boy's baseball team again via Godfrey Parks and Recreation.

#### NEW BUSINESS

- \* For those unaware, Robin Lusardi has moved to Columbus, Ohio, leaving the Vice President's position open. We will be looking into replacement candidates.
- \* Council voted to contract with Sick Lawn Care and Landscape at the cost of \$200 per cut this year. Although we had no issues with Clark's, Sisk will include weed control for the landscaping. As of writing this, they have already done the first cut and treated for weeds.

#### **OLD BUSINESS**

Neal and Kay are actively getting quotes on banners to advertise special services like Veterans Day, Lent, etc. . . Both Council and the Worship Committee are supportive of the idea as it's something physically seen by people driving by the church that catches the eye. So far, the cost of large banners seem to be very affordable from Neal's findings.
