Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Good, exciting things continue to happen here at Resurrection. I hope that you have marked your calendars for the three car shows coming up. Please invite your friends and neighbors to stop by for coffee, sweets, conversation and fellowship, all happening while we admire some gorgeous cars of all sorts.

Second Sunday Lunch Bunch begins June 9. So, what is this? About a month ago, somehow Rod and Cheryl Margherio and I got to talking about our good experiences and memories of eating at the Wittmond Hotel in Brussels. We were wondering if it was still open and wouldn't it be fun to go eat there. And so was born the idea of a **"Second Sunday Lunch Bunch."** I presented the idea to council, and they heartily approved! Following worship all are welcome to gather for lunch at a local restaurant. Our first eating place will be the Wittmond Hotel. For those not familiar, the Wittmond Hotel is an old restaurant that is on the National Register of Historic Places. At one time, they offered rooms to rent to travelers. Now, it is a restaurant that is only open Friday, Saturday and Sunday. They serve only one family-style meal and is it ever a memorable meal! Fried Chicken and Sausage with all the trimmings mashed potatoes, corn, green beans and such. All of it delicious! A special dessert cobbler is available at an extra cost as is roast beef which is \$1.00 more per serving. The price is about \$25.00 a person, which is more than I anticipate most of our Lunch Bunch meals will cost. But at the Wittmond, you're not just getting a terrific meal, you get the historic atmosphere and great memories with your meal.

I remember as a little kid, my parents ate at the Wittmond several times with the couple's club at their church. I didn't get to experience it for myself until many years later. It is worth it and it is memorable. I hope that you will want to join us.

The upcoming car shows present a wonderful opportunity for us to share our church and our faith with others. Have you ever heard it said "I'm a Christian, but I don't need to go to church. I can pray anywhere." Yes, this is true, but I honestly believe that God intends us to be a part of a church community. Here are some thoughts for you to consider in response to the question of "Why do I need a church?" I'm quoting a Methodist pastor, C Don Jones, who answers the question superbly.

Mutual Help

Community is like experience. You don't feel the need for it until you need it. People find themselves alone in the hard times of life. They also can find themselves alone at times that should be celebrated. Churches provide community. Kurt Vonnegut wrote the novel <u>Slapstick</u> as a means to discuss the need for extended families. New parents need help. They may have help from family. And they may have help from churches. Established families receiving a new child need these connections even more. There are other children to care for in addition to the new arrival that consume most of the parents' time.

The same problem presents itself when a loved one is ill. Being a caregiver is a huge burden that should really be shared. Christians should be involved in churches that provide aid for one another. Nurture ministries are a large part of church life. Signing up and showing up for each other should be an important part of choosing a church home.

The Need to Share Worship

Does your congregation pray for each other? We are all aware of the pitfall that a church can become self-focused and only be concerned about its members. The church meeting for shared worship is often discounted by people. When I (C Don Jones) was at the lowest point in my life, having experienced public humiliation and embarrassed by my addiction, I decided to risk going to church. Why? Because I was seeking something I knew only the church could provide me – other people who will worship with me. The music may not have been what I wanted. I had no idea how I would react to the sermon. Putting these things together though was worship no matter what my view of the quality would be.

Shared worship is one of the major reasons churches exist. We need to greet each other, sing together, and pray together. Our God hears us in our disconnection to the larger community and in our attempt to have community that is beneficial.

Co-Existence

Christians need congregations in order to co-exist with our neighbors. This is a more nuanced viewpoint. Shared worship and the practice of mutual aid helps us learn how to live among people who think differently. Spiritual discipline teaches us to live in peace and patience with each other. We then have the discipline to do live in patience and peace with people who do not practice these things.

Neighbors irritate us. We should remember that we irritate them in some way. If we expand the parable of the Good Samaritan, the practice of loving the injured stranger is understood to

develop out of the worship of Samaritans. However the ancient Samaritans observed torah in their community, the actions of neighborliness came from this observance. The commandment "You shall love your neighbor as yourself" was taught and kept by the Samaritan community. Mutual love of one's coreligionist becomes love for the stranger.

Growing In Understanding

I can read scripture, theology, and everything else and believe I have some idea about what is right, moral, ethical, and true. However, until I test these ideas, their implications and applications with other Christians, I do not really grow in understanding and wisdom.

Deepening our own experiences of grace and truth requires this be shared among others. I have high opinions of my opinions. Knowing my opinions are truly valid requires discussion with someone else. The first step is learning how to explain my ideas to another person without attempting to persuade. The next step is listening. Group discussions are better for this kind of testing.

The Meaning of These 4 Reasons

You need a church. Christians need connection for all of the reasons stated above. I recognize that it is not easy. It is why many of us fail to take part in churches. We have to exert effort to build up communities of disciples. Churches are changing in many ways. The old truth remains. Our neighbors need us. The neglected and marginalized need us. We need to encourage each other in these efforts.

Community Attracts the Holy Spirit

Acts 2:46–47: Every day they continued to meet together in the temple courts. They broke bread in their homes and ate together with glad and sincere hearts, praising God and enjoying the favor of all the people. And the Lord added to their number daily those who were being saved.

The book of Acts made a habit of people meeting together, eating together, and worshiping together. Being in church on Sundays is definitely important, but community in any place can involve God.

In today's everchanging world, we don't change the Christian message. The message changes us and our approach with the world around us. A Christian's beliefs centers around the relationship between the believer and God based on messages seen and heard in the Bible. The gospel and all of Scripture reinforces the truth that we were created for community.

God created us not to be isolated beings, but rather people who live with others. The primary way that we as Christians live in community is by belonging to the church. 

Book Club


Karen Woods volunteered to be our leader for meeting on **May 9th**. Her book of choice is <u>All the Broken</u> <u>Places</u>, by John Boyne. The book is available at the library.

Summary: <u>All The Broken Places</u> moves back and forth in time between Gretel's girlhood in Germany to present-day London as a woman whose life has been haunted by the past. Now, Gretel faces a similar crossroads to one she encountered long ago. Back then, she denied her own complicity, but now, faced with a chance to interrogate her guilt, grief and remorse, she can choose to save a young boy. If she does, she will be forced to reveal the secrets she has spent a lifetime protecting. This time, she can make a different choice than before—whatever the cost to herself....



Teresa Droste has offered to be our discussion leader for our **June 13th** Book Club meeting. Her book choice is **<u>The Maid</u>** by **Nita Prose**. It is available at the library.

Summary: "A dead body is one mess she can't clean up on her own. Molly Gray is not like everyone else. She struggles with social skills and often misreads people's intentions. But no matter--she still throws herself with gusto into her work as a hotel maid at the five-star Regency Grand. Her obsessive love of cleaning and proper etiquette makes her an ideal fit for the job. She delights in donning her crisp uniform each morning, stocking her cart with miniature soaps, and returning guest rooms to a state of perfection. But Molly's orderly life is upended the day she enters the suite of the infamous and wealthy Charles Black, only to find Mr. Black dead--very dead--in his bed. Perplexed by Molly's unusual behavior, the police immediately suspect her of murder. She's soon caught in a web of deception with no idea how to untangle herself. Highlight's from Church Council – April

I REPORTS

* Treasurer's Report: Total offering for March was \$16,943.76. Total income was \$17,854.79. Total ex-

penses were \$13,103.99. We had a \$350 bill for shingle repairs and slight increases in salary for Pastor and Russ due to extra services.

* President's Report: Neal presented the banner that Council ordered for the Cars Coffee and Community. I

He discussed ideas for the message on a Veteran's Day banner, the next one that will be ordered.

* Pastor's Report:

- Pastor appreciated all those that helped clean and protect the wood on April 14.
- The Visit to Dar-Ul-Islam is May 5. As of writing this at least 10 people are signed up.
- The study of Islam will conclude in April or early May. The next topic for Adult Study is "Civic Life and Faith," a study prepared by ELCA. Videos and Participant Guides are included.
- Beyond July, pastor would like to add a 2nd office day to better fulfill obligations like visiting the homebound and those sick and/or hospitalized. Her goal is to offer communion at least twice a month to those unable to attend worship. She would like to increase that frequency to 3 or 4 times a month by recruiting and training members to assist her. Details to follow as summer approaches.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

* Social Committee: Sharon Groh briefly shared with us two proposals for feedback. She would like to partner with Taylor Neese to interview church leaders and highlight results on the bulletin board, social media, etc. This will be a condensed version of "I am Lutheran" model. She has also asked the Boy Scouts to help with Men's Club bench building/painting and/or garden prep/planting. She has encouraged them to participate in the spring workday, the concert and Cars Coffee and Community.

* **Men's Club:** Concert plans appear to be finalized as of our meeting. Neal invited several area churches to attend. Plans for the Cars Coffee and Community continue. Neal has also secured a 30-cup coffee pot to aid in these events. We thank Dan Garner and the men for their diligence in planning these events.

* **Book Club:** Neal invited Ruth and the Book Club to host a table at the Cars Coffee and Community. Ruth accepted, is working on a flyer and they will be assisting with coffee and fellowship/witnessing.

* **Community Garden:** Mark Groh reached out to the Alton Food bank and obtained a list of needed vegetables. Planting took place on 4/13. They do not need squash, zucchini and/or cucumbers as those already come from Godfrey's Community Garden.

NEW BUSINESS

* Mike Golec has accepted the position of Vice President to replace Robin Lusardi who has moved to Ohio.

We thank Mike for stepping up to help us out the remainder of the year.

* Two items were tabled pending further research- contracting a cleaning service and a trash service. The

- time has come for both services to be implemented into our budget due to age, health restrictions and
- limited availability of members already stretched thin due to other church related commitments.

* A new transport chair is in the process of being secured to aid those wishing to attend who need assistance from their vehicle to the sanctuary.

* Dan Callahan is securing prices on replacing the fencing around the 4 air conditioning units that face Homer Adams and Delmar.

* Pastor Jan, Rich Kelley and Elyse Tillman will be attending the 2024 Synod Assembly.
