
As the first day of summer approaches on June 20th, stop and ask yourself . . .

What temperature are you set on?



Thermostats and thermometers both deal in temperature but in very different ways. One measures the temperature and one defines it.

It's common to hear about thermometers these days. With seasonal waves of Covid, it seems that some are obsessed (and rightfully so) with measuring body temperature. With record setting heat trends becoming the norm for the Greater Metro St. Louis area, some may find themselves frequently looking at an outdoor thermometer near a window, or the one on their vehicle dashboard, or even the one on their phone/tablet. And, I bet there is even one or two of us that quite possibly uses one at the grill to double check BBQ masterpieces for that perfect internal temperature.

During the last two weeks of May, we have experienced quite the extremes of weather here locally. We saw several days of record high temperatures during the daytime, often followed by heavy downpours and severe weather during the late afternoon or evening. We had temperatures at or near 90 and woke up to mid 60s. If you're like me, you probably found yourself having to change the thermostat setting in the house just trying to keep up and make it more comfortable inside.

Anyone can be a measure of temperature (whether in culture or for a person) by observing what others think and how they live. However, you could also be like a thermostat. Those people are people of integrity. They set the temperature for their culture by following God's Word. Paul encouraged his son in Timothy with these words. He said, "Don't let anyone think less of you because you are young. Be an example to all believers in what you say, in the way you live, in your love, your faith, and your purity" (I Timothy 4:12). It seems the world around us sets the temperature in which we live. As humans, we want to fit in, fly under the radar, and go with the ups and downs of life without being changed. We merely live by the temperature set for us by others in our culture.

Today, I want to urge you to have a standard for integrity, meaning to live with purpose. We set the temperature by refusing to "conform to the pattern of the world, but are transformed by the renewing of our minds" (Romans 12:2).

We set the tone of our world when we choose to fill our minds with God's Word. His Truth can help change our hearts, minds, and attitudes. Go to God's Word today! God promises that He will go with you and guide you as you live for Him.

"Father, thank You for Your Word and how it has the power to change our hearts and minds with Truth. You walk with us in our daily lives and give us the power to set a good example of how to follow You. Please show us the ways to grow as we follow You. We praise You for Your Word. Amen."

"We **achieved** our monetary goals through generous donations. A heartfelt THANK YOU to everyone."



Highlight's from Church Council - May

REPORTS

- * Treasurer's Report: Total offering for April was \$10,518.22. Total income was \$11,717.33. Total expenses were \$11,257.38. This was an average month. The only unusual expense was the purchase of a wheelchair for church use.
- * President's Report: Neal shared with council that the Vice President's position is open. Mike Golec has returned to his former church. Three candidates will be contacted.

* Pastor's Report:

- Pastor was approached about concerns with Radon in the building. Council tabled this until our next meeting to get quotes on an inspection.
- The Men's Club will be contacted to check and label windows for operation and replace screens as needed so that one window in each room of the church can be opened for ventilation.
- Concerns with keys, who has one, and to what, will be addressed as the former master list is gone. Kay Tucker will be contacting members directly to fulfill this obligation. Neal and Pastor will be the only two members with keys to the lock box per established church guidelines.
- Elyse Tillman, Rich Kelley and Pastor Jan will be attending the Synod Assembly June 6-8. Registration fees and lodging will be paid. A motion was made and passed to provide each person a \$50 -day stipend.
- Pastor is in the process of developing a Planning and Implementation Team. The team will have priorities to include evangelism/outreach, re-evaluate committees, address visitations, address home bound Holy Eucharist and long-term planning to name a few.
- Sunday Adult Study continues with "Faith and Civic Life." The next study will be "Experiencing God," followed by "The American Religious Experience." All studies include video and a participant guide.
- Bible Study and Board Games is a future activity being considered for possible fellowship.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

* **Social Committee:** Sharon Groh is actively working with members of our community to prepare for a meaningful "God's Work, Our Hands" service project this fall. To learn more, attend a potluck dinner on Sunday, July 28.

* Technology Team:



It has come to our attention that unknown users are linking their phones to our church's main Wi-Fi account. At least 10 users were on the main account during the Cars, Coffee and Community event. This is completely unacceptable. Dan Callahan has Council's full support to start revoking unnecessary access. Moving forward, Dan and the Tech Team will determine who shall have access and why.

* **Scouts:** The Scouts hung flags on State and Henry Street on May 25th in honor of Memorial Day. Twelve youth and 6 adults are registered for the Lake of the Ozarks Reservation summer camp June 23-29. The Scouts have been approached about assisting us with God's Work, Our Hands. Sharon Groh is preparing packets to be shared with the congregation so that members with a trade or talent amongst us may consider sharing their expertise with a Scout who is working on a merit badge.

NEW BUSINESS

- * Council approved Margie Snep as our replacement of an at-large member.
- * Council will contact Fellowship to provide farewell refreshments for Russ following worship on June 23.

CONTINUING BUSINESS

- * Council voted to accept the bid from Superior Fence to place new, 4ft white vinyl privacy fence around the AC compressors on the back side of the church.
- * Council is actively searching for a cleaning service. A list of weekly duties was created. Council felt that a company vs. an independent person would better suit our needs. More to follow as we begin contacting local businesses.
- * Obtaining trash service has been mentioned numerous times to Council over the past two years. Council was ready to accept a more than reasonable bid from Republic Services, but members insist this is not necessary. The idea will be considered null and void at this time.
