Either way we turn over a new leaf, saying goodbye to languid summer afternoons and enjoy a short interlude before the holiday crash begins. We can think of September as giving us a little breath between summer and autumn.

It's a new season representing summer's farewell and the cheerful introduction to autumn festivities. The grandkids are back in school. We slowly pull warmer layers out of the closets, we watch the leaves turn from green to golden, and we plan for the upcoming holiday season. Before you know it, it will be time to carve the pumpkins, then the turkey, ending it all with a ham.

As we take a few moments to look around and see all the beauty literally changing in front of our eyes, we know that soon enough those golden leaves will wither and drop to the ground leaving the trees bare and ready for new life. The "good news" is the fact that there are several bible verses that can help ground us through these changes or any others that may be challenging us. Here are a few for you to reflect on this month;

\* Moreover, I will give you a new heart and put a new spirit within you; and I will remove the heart of stone from your flesh and give you a heart of flesh. (Ezekiel 36:26)

This reminds us that we can always change, if we were once hard we can become loving once again. Think back to the cold hard frozen ground and how it will become soft and spring back to life.

\* It was for freedom that Christ set us free; therefore, keep standing firm and do not be subject again to a yoke of slavery. (Galatians 5:1)

*Yes, once we are free from it continue to move forward. Try to stop looking back.* 

\* I am coming quickly; hold firmly to what you have, so that no one will take your crown. (Revelation 3:11)

This verse tells us to stay strong in the Lord, continue to read the bible, and stay strong against the enemy. Don't stray from God when troubles come, lean into him more at that point.

\* But now that you have come to know God, or rather to be known by God, how is it that you turn back again to the weak and worthless elementary principles, to which you want to be enslaved all over again?" (Galatians 4:9)

This verse tells us when we have been set free from something to not let it come back. When you feel like your stuck in a bad place, it can help remind us of how far God has brought us and that he will continue to lead the way.

The bible reminds us that no matter how far we have come or what has happened God will always bring you back into the light if he is with you.

\* Then I shall give you rains in their season, so that the land will yield its produce and the trees of the field will bear their fruit. (Leviticus 26:4).

This reminds us that God will always provide, he is our provider and we can trust him through all seasons.

\* Do not worry then, saying, 'What are we to eat?' or 'What are we to drink?' or 'What are we to wear for clothing?' For the Gentiles eagerly seek all these things; for your heavenly Father knows that you need all these things. But seek first His kingdom and His righteousness, and all these things will be provided to you. (Matthew 6:31-33)


This bible verse tells us not to worry and that God is always there. He will provide for all of our needs, we just need to seek him first in everything we do.


## **Book Club**

Vickie Baggio has volunteered to be the discussion leader for our meeting on **September 12th at 6:30 pm.** Her book choice is <u>Lessons in Chemistry</u> by **Bonnie Garmus**. Our local library does not have the book, but they can get the book through several other libraries. The good news is from what I saw, they are all in large print. This should give everyone plenty of time to get the book read by September 12th.

Chemist Elizabeth Zott is not your average woman. In fact, Elizabeth Zott would be the first to point out that there is no such thing a an average woman. But it's the early 1960s and her all-male team at Hastings Research Institute takes a very unscientific view of equality. Except for one: Calvin Evans; the lonely, bril-

*liant, Nobel–prize nominated grudge-holder who falls in love with—of all things her mind. True chemistry results.* 

But like science, life is unpredictable. Which is why a few years later Elizabeth Zott finds herself not only a single mother, but the reluctant star of America's most beloved cooking show Supper at Six. Elizabeth's unusual approach to cooking ("combine one tablespoon acetic acid with a pinch of sodium chloride") proves revolutionary. But as her following grows, not everyone is happy. Because as it turns out, Elizabeth Zott isn't just teaching women to cook. She's daring them to change the status quo.



Laugh-out-loud funny, shrewdly observant, and studded with a dazzling cast of supporting characters, Lessons in Chemistry is as original and vibrant as its protagonist.

October the 10th, at 6:30 pm, Ruth Wolter will be the discussion leader and her book choice is <u>True Colors</u> by Kristin Hannah.



Following worship, teams of 3, some accompanied by an off-duty firefighter will be visiting homes in need of one of these devices, setting them up and briefly speaking to them about Resurrection.

Collections for fire alarms and carbon monoxide detectors will continue through the 8th. *Fire alarms must be those with a 10-year battery. Carbon monoxide detectors must be either the plug-in type or the ceiling/wall mount and must specify "Nighthawk" on them. Cash donations will be accepted as well.* 



## **Social Committee**

Source: "The Pets for the Elderly Foundation (PFE)" a 501 (c)(3) public charity whose mission is to provide companionship to senior individuals through pet ownership, while saving the lives of companion animals in shelters; animals which might otherwise be destroyed due to lack of appropriate homes, and space limitations,

While any pet owner can certainly attest to the many benefits of living with a furry friend, research confirming the health benefits of senior pet ownership have appeared in many well-respected publications and medical journals.

Studies have shown that the bond between people and their pets can increase fitness, lower stress, and bring happiness to their owners. Some of the health benefits of having a pet include decreased blood pressure, decreased cholesterol and triglyceride levels, decreased feelings of loneliness and increased opportunities for socialization.

For older adults, playing with pets can be a mentally stimulating activity. There is a reason dogs are emotional support animals. They know how to recognize signs of anxiety humans can't detect in others. Other benefits of pets often cited by professionals supporting seniors include:

- Interacting with animals can stimulate the release of feel-good chemicals in the brain that boost mood.
- Walking a pet can help strengthen muscles in the torso, arms, and legs and improve coordination.

Please help achieve our social ministry outreach mission within our community by supporting our elderly neighbors struggling to pay for the necessary pet food or cat litter. Any donation helps. Proceeds will be shared with local animal rescue organizations and Senior Services Plus for client distribution, as needed.

## Highlight's from Church Council – August

#### REPORTS

- \* Treasurer's Report: Total offering for July was \$9,787.22. Total income was \$10,100.97. We were down from previous years for the month, but still over for the year. Total expenses for the month were \$12,034.79. We paid our annual insurance and adjusted the monthly set-aside to cover a slight rate increase. We also adjusted the set-aside for the major repairs fund to \$2,000 a month as lingering projects including the roof, entry doors and damaged brick planter are all pending repairs within the next 2 -3 years.
- \* President's Report: Neal updated us on several Committee Reports. He also addressed picking a date and menu for the upcoming Mortgage Celebration. Council picked the date of Sept. 22 with catering provided by Dorothy's Tea Room, East Alton. Members of Council met on Tuesday Aug. 20 to select the menu. Neal made flyers and a sign-up sheet to accompany the announcements made in church.

#### **\*** Pastor's Report:

- The PI team has met twice with a focus on organizing Homebound Communion. There are now 10 members signed up to assist in this service to our church family. Training for that took place on August 25<sup>th</sup>. Three, possibly 4 homebound members have been identified to receive communion. The next PI meeting will be Sept. 10 and focus on outreach.
- Pastor has assembled a small prayer book to include in the goodie bags for God's Work, Our Hands project. This may also serve as a future tool in our outreach efforts.
- A request to rent our sanctuary for a wedding was received by a local Godfrey resident and will be declined. Young Hall will be made available if they opt for that choice instead.
- 2<sup>nd</sup> Sunday Lunch Bunch will not meet in Sept. as God's Work Our Hands lands on that weekend following worship. We will reconvene on October 13 and visit Harvest House in Jerseyville.
- Blessing of the Pets service will be Oct. 6. The Worship Committee and Council approved a pet drive for October to benefit 5As, Hope Rescue and the Alton Senior Services Plus
- Pastor will be on Vacation Sept. 30 Nov. 1 relaxing in Michigan.

\* **Men's Club:** Council reviewed and approved the Men's Club sponsoring a Christmas Concert on Dec. 7, the Chili Drive on Oct. 10, 17 & 24 and having a Thrivent Representative visit our congregation (TBD).
