A busy September leads into an active Autumn here at Resurrection.

On the calendar:

October 6 – **Blessing of Pets** after Worship. All pets are welcome to attend worship and receive a special blessing. Pets will get treats and a collar charm made by me. The collar charm may be clipped to their collar, leash or carrier as a reminder to their humans that this pet is loved and blessed by God. Blessed to be a blessing for their humans, just as we are loved and blessed by God to be a blessing to others. Please bring your pet on a leash or in a carrier. Not all animals consider it a blessing to attend worship. This is true for many cats. If this includes your pet, you may bring a picture of your pet or a stuffed animal to represent your pet to receive a blessing "in abstentia."

To attempt to block your voice during responses, we must switch different microphones off and on. This is troublesome since we have to turn one mic on before shutting the other mic off or we generate a "dead" spot in the audio. Your help is greatly appreciated.

**3)** I have blocked several IP Addresses from the main network since Council approved this action. If you have been blocked, please join the GUEST network or see any Tech Team member (Tim Belfield, Rich Kelley, Dan Callahan) for access.

**4)** Also, let Rich, Tim or I know before the music starts if you have any announcements so we can get a mic to you. Without using a mic, those that watch from home and those that don't hear as well as others, can't hear what is being said.


Summary: The Grey sisters had only each other when their mother died. Their father provided for them physically on Water's Edge, the ranch that had been in their family for three generations, but he was emotionally absent. Growing up, the Grey sisters longed for love. Winona, an overweight dreamer, knew that she could never get it--she didn't have the talents and strengths her father valued. Vivi Ann did. But when Vivi Ann makes a fateful decision to follow her heart, rather than take the route of dutiful daughter, events are set in motion that will test the love and loyalty of sisterhood.



November's book with Janet Broche as discussion leader is **Book of Lost Names** by Kristin Harmel. We will meet on November 14th, at 6:30 pm.

Summary: Eva Traube Abrams, a semiretired librarian in Florida, is at the returns desk one morning when her eyes lock on to a photograph in a newspaper nearby. She freezes; it's an image of a book she hasn't seen in sixty-five years--a book she recognizes as the Book of Lost Names. The accompanying article de-

scribes the looting of libraries across Europe by the Nazis during World War II--an experience Eva remembers all too well. As a graduate student in 1942, Eva was forced to flee Paris after the arrest of her father, a Polish Jew. Finding refuge in a small mountain town in the Free Zone, she begins forging identity documents for Jewish children fleeing to neutral Switzerland. But erasing people comes with a price, and along with a mysterious, handsome forger named Rémy, Eva decides she must find a way to preserve the real names of the children who are too young to remember who they really are. The records they keep in the Book of Lost Names will become even more vital when the Resistance cell they work with is betrayed and Rémy disappears. As the Germans close in, Eva records a last, vital message in the book. Decades later, does she have the strength to seek out its answer--and help reunite those lost during the war?

## **Properties Committee Update**

We would like to thank Ruth Wolters, Rich Kelley, Joe Wyatt, Tim Belfield, Sharon Groh, Pat Ford, and Jim Leiber for helping Dan and I with the following: We removed 6 bushes, trimmed weeds and tall grass along the ditch area, cleaned the venetian blinds in the office areas, trimmed the Arborvitaes in the planter, picked up sticks that had fallen from trees around the property, and started work on the drain line from the roof. The drain line for the downspouts is blocked causing water to enter under the doors next to altar. The south side drain line is not draining because it appears to be blocked by the large evergreen tree. We are planning to locate the 4 tie-ins from the downspouts and trench a new main line to replace the blocked one. This will alleviate the water entering the Sanctuary during heavy rains. ## Highlight's from Church Council – September

## REPORTS

\* **Treasurer's Report:** Total offering for the month was \$11,024.22. Total income was \$11,496.97. Total expenses were \$12,428.18. This includes \$500 for cleaning contract and \$332 for our annual copyright license fee. The cash flow balance for the month was -939.21. This is just natural from the flow of bills and income. The checking account balance was \$19,692.56. Our Money Market is growing again due to month-ly set-asides. We have also increased the major repair/building set-aside from \$750 to \$2500 pending several major repairs in the next couple of years.

\* President's Report: Neal had no committee reports to share and/or concerns.

#### \* Pastor's Report:

- Pastor has taken note that we are offering Portals of Prayer published by the LCMS rather than options produced by the ELCA. Dependent upon our current billing cycle, we will consider switching out devotionals.
- Council has been asked to consider options for creating an endowment fund through the ELCA. This would be a wise investment for our future, especially now that the mortgage is paid.
- PI Team now has homebound communion in place for two recipients. The team will continue to
  discuss outreach further on Oct. 2. Questions posed include; What do we have and what do we
  need? The goal will be to take what we have and "add to" and support it. Some upcoming examples will be including a small flyer in chili sales, inviting senior/care facitlites to our Veteran's
  Day Worship and Christmas Concert.
- Our search for finding a new organist and/or pianist has become grim. Russ has agreed to lead our Veteran's Day service again. . . THANK YOU ! The future of live music moving forward, especially during the winter months and Holiday services is up in the air. *Please pray that someone reaches out to us.*
- Pastor will be away for the Fall Theological Seminar Sept. 31-Oct. 2 at Pere Marquette.
- Pastor will be on vacation in Michigan Oct. 21- Nov. 1. Rev. Thomas Krackle will lead us in worship on Oct. 27th.

## NEW BUSINESS

\* Council is discussing a Stewardship Drive for 2024. It has been two years since the last one. Before a

pledge card and letter are sent out, upcoming concerns like a new roof, the brick planter, entry doors and electrical issues will be shared at both the Mortgage Celebration and the Annual meeting. Despite the mortgage being paid, we have to stress to all that the expenses won't stop there. We are potentially looking at \$50,000+ in building maintenance over the next 1-5 years.
