

Five Christian Reminders for the 4th of July

1. The 4th of July reminds us that our nation was founded by men who recognized God was their Creator.

The 4th of July celebrates the adopting of the Declaration of Independence by Congress on July 4, 1776. The document begins with Thomas Jefferson's famous words:

"We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their **Creator** with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of happiness."

• With the words, "endowed by their Creator" Thomas Jefferson gave credit to God for the "Rights" we have. He called them "unalienable" because he knew they were given by God and couldn't be taken away.

2. The 4th of July reminds us of our true freedom.

We are thankful for independence from Great Britain. But we are more thankful for the greater independence Jesus has given us from the Law:

- Romans 10:4—Christ is the end of the law for righteousness to everyone who believes.
- Galatians 3:24-25—Therefore the law was our tutor to bring us to Christ, that we might be justified by faith. But after faith has come, we are no longer under a tutor.

3. The 4th of July reminds us of our dual-citizenship.

We are thankful for our American citizenship, but we are even more thankful for our citizenship in heaven:

- Ephesians 2:19—So then you are no longer strangers and aliens, but you are fellow citizens with the saints and members of the household of God.
- Philippians 3:19—But our citizenship is in heaven, and from it we await a Savior, the Lord Jesus Christ.
- Hebrews 11:16—But as it is, [the heroes of the faith] desire a better country, that is, a heavenly one. Therefore God is not ashamed to be called their God, for he has prepared for them a city.

4. The 4th of July reminds us of the freedoms we can yield.

Paul said Christians should see themselves as slaves:

1 Corinthians 6:19-20—Do you not know that you are not your own? You were bought at a price; therefore, glorify God in your body and in your spirit, which are God's.

In becoming Christians we've chosen to give up our freedom to live for Christ . This entails <u>giving up some of our freedoms for our brothers and sisters in Christ</u>:

- Romans 14:21—It is good neither to eat meat nor drink wine nor do anything by which your brother stumbles or is offended or is made weak.
- 1 Corinthians 8:13—Therefore, if food makes my brother stumble, I will never again eat meat, lest I make my brother stumble.

5. The 4^{th} of July reminds us of the sacrifices that were made for our freedom.

We think about the sacrifices of countless soldiers who have lost their lives. Without their bravery we wouldn't have many of the blessings we enjoy today.

But we should think about the greatest sacrifice that was made for our freedom. There is a common saying: "Freedom isn't free." To enjoy the freedom we have in our country, people had to pay for it. Likewise, someone had to pay for the freedoms we enjoy from the Law and the punishment our sins deserve:

Philippians 2:6-8 [Jesus] being in the form of God, did not consider it robbery to be equal with God, but made Himself of no reputation, taking the form of a bondservant, *and* coming in the likeness of men. And being found in appearance as a man, He humbled Himself and became obedient to *the point of* death, even the death of the cross.

In John 10:18 [Jesus said], "No one takes [My life] from Me, but I lay it down of Myself." Jesus was saying, "I have the freedom to keep my life, but I'm willing to give it up for you."

As Christians we enjoy many wonderful freedoms. Let's be reminded of them each 4th of July, recognizing it's only because of Jesus' willingness to give up His freedom for us.

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

The Second Sunday Lunch Bunch goes to Dorothy's Tea Room July 14. We'll gather after worship and carpool to the Brunch Buffet at Dorothy's. Taken from Dorothy's Tea Room Website, Sunday Brunch is: "Made to order omlete station, biscuits & gravy, hot ham & cheese sliders, hashbrown casserole, fresh fruit, sausage, bacon, yogurt parfait, assorted pastries, desserts and more! All you can eat! All of our food is made with love, just like Grandma Dorothy did it! \$16.49 for adults. Includes iced tea, coffee, lemonade and water." Sounds yummy! Please sign-up at church by July 7 if you'd like to come along and please let me know if you'd be willing to drive.

Beginning July 8 and pending official approval from our council, I will be increasing my time at Resurrection to two days between Monday and Friday and Sunday. This will allow me to have some time for hospital calls and visits. Generally, I will be in the office on Monday. The weekly calendar will determine when the second day will be. For example, if there is a meeting or mid-week worship scheduled, that day will be my second day at church.

I am introducing a **Planning and Implementation Team** or "PI Team," for short. This is a council approved task force that will be led by me and accountable to the council. There are four primary goals for the PI Team:

- Visitation. The PI team will help to recruit teams of volunteers to visit and bring Holy Communion to our home bound members at least twice a month. I hope that we will have enough volunteers so that each volunteer will make home calls once a month. I will also be a part of that rotation. Volunteers will be trained and prepared for this task by me.
- Outreach. The PI Team will work with other groups in our congregation to organize and coordinate outreach to our friends and neighbors.
- Committee Structure. We have several committees. Some have not met at all during the year plus that I have been serving you. Do we need all of them? Could some of them be combined? What can/could/should we do to get these groups active? The PI Team will wrestle with those questions.
- Long Range Planning. We have no long-range plans and we really should have some. Long Range Plans can help to guide our outreach, our ministry, and our purpose for being a church in our community

I will be contacting potential members of the PI Team by email during the first week of July. If you would like to be a part of this team, please let me know. It will function a little differently than you may have experienced before. Every PI Team member is welcome to attend every meeting, but not every team member will be expected to attend every meeting. This is a wonderful opportunity for you to get involved with the "nuts and bolts" of our church and for you to be an important part of shaping the future of Resurrection. Please add the work of the PI Team to your prayers. Our first meeting will be Thursday, July 18, at 6:30 P.M. at church.

Please be sure to mark your calendar for our **Potluck on the last Sunday in July.** Hosted by the Faithful Innovations and Social Ministry Teams, we will enjoy wonderful food and learn about our special project for "God's Work, Our Hands" Sunday in September





Our Community Garden team sends heartfelt thanks to all who contributed to the waterline project for the garden. We received all the funds needed to do this project. On Saturday, June 15th a crew of 4 began the work at 6 am trying to be ahead of the heat. The tie-in to the main water line to the barn proved to be more difficult as the line was not in a straight line from the meter to the barn. It was several feet to the east and took the crew nearly 2 hours to find. Once found all went well with connecting and running the line to the new yard hydrant inside the garden fence. All work was completed by 2 in the afternoon. Thanks be to God that all went well.

We were blessed with a good crew. Special thanks to Joanne's son, Richard Taylor who provided his labor and a mini excavator. It could not have been done without him and the excavator. He also has the talent in using divining rods to help find the main waterline. A big thanks to Alan Robertson and Joe Wyatt for their great work on a hot Saturday. Rich Kelley helped keep the project moving.

I Just a side note that God works in mysterious ways. We originally wanted to do this project late in May but weather delayed the start. Before we were able to start, the state put right-a-way stakes for the road work on Homer Adams Parkway. Dan & Carol Callahan and Rich Kelley met with IDOT to determine that about 1/4th of the garden is on state property and the planned location of the yard hydrant would have been on state property. IDOT is unconcerned about the garden on state property, farmers do that all the time. If the state needed to use all the right-a-way we can easily move the garden. But the hydrant and waterline would have to be moved at our expense. Knowing the location of the right-a-way, we were able to run the waterline and hydrant on our property. Thank you, Lord.

July is a month when many take vacations or have family get-togethers to celebrate and **proclaim** the freedoms of our great country, America. Enjoy the holiday with your family and friends, or use the day to send some cheer to a shut-in, maybe a veteran, who would truly appreciate being remembered.

On **August 8th**, we will have an evening of good food, fun and fellowship at a local restaurant. Details will be made available later.

In September, Vickie Baggio has volunteered to be the discussion leader. Her book choice is <u>Lessons in</u>

<u>Chemistry</u> by Bonnie Garmus. Our local library does not have the book, but they can get the book through several other libraries. The good news is what I saw they are all in large print. This should give everyone plenty of time to get the book read by September 12th.

Chemist Elizabeth Zott is not your average woman. In fact, Elizabeth Zott would be the first to point out that there is no such thing a an average woman. But it's the early 1960s and her all-male team at Hastings Research Institute takes a very unscientific view of equality. Except for one: Calvin Evans; the lonely, brilliant, Nobel-prize nominated grudge-holder who falls in love with—of all things—her mind. True chemistry results.

But like science, life is unpredictable. Which is why a few years later Elizabeth Zott finds herself not only a single mother, but the reluctant star of America's most beloved cooking show Supper at Six. Elizabeth's unusual approach to cooking ("combine one tablespoon acetic acid with a pinch of sodium chloride") proves revolutionary. But as her following grows, not everyone is happy. Because as it turns out, Elizabeth Zott isn't just teaching women to cook. She's daring them to change the status quo.

Laugh-out-loud funny, shrewdly observant, and studded with a dazzling cast of supporting characters, Lessons in Chemistry is as original and vibrant as its protagonist.

Greetings,

We bring you good news and inspiration from the 2024 Synod Assembly, held June 6-8 in Decatur, IL.

This year's theme, "Many Gifts, One Mission" served as a good reminder that we ALL have been given a gift from God, some of us more than one. We are encouraged to use our gift(s) to bring the Gospel of Christ to our little part of the world.

We can use our gifts by partnering with other churches in our conference and partnering with other churches in our community. The hope is that more churches will be able to interact and participate with one another in the next year.

We are 110 congregations strong in the Southern Illinois Synod of the ELCA! Although some congregations may be getting smaller, this is not the only narrative: our churches are still alive in Christ, and active in communities, and that is good news!

Although many Central/Southern IL congregations are small, together we can make a difference. We have been invited to connect and share with other congregations through social media.

This year's assembly was well attended with 145 voting lay persons, 86 clergy and 46 guests totaling 277.
That averages over 2 representatives from each congregation. It was so great to see Pastor Ken Tegtmeier and Nancy – they send their greetings to everyone.

We had amazing Bible studies each and every day – a good reminder that the word is God, and Jesus is alive in the word to this day. There are still things to discover in readings!

2024 Synod Assembly



"LIKE GOOD STEWARDS OF THE MANIFOLD GRACE OF GOD, SERVE ONE ANOTHER WITH WHATEVER GIFT EACH OF YOU HAS RECEIVED" 1 PETER 4:10.

The 2024 Central/Southern Illinois Synod Assembly was held June 6-8 at Decatur Conference Center and Hotel with 277 people in attendance, including 145 lay voting members, 86 rostered ministers, and 46 visitors.

Bishop Greg Busboom presided over his first Synod Assembly with the theme of "Many Gifts, One Mission," based on 1 Peter 4:10, highlighting that we each have different gifts that we bring together to carry out the one mission of the church.

This year's Assembly featured a large slate of elections for open positions at both the synod and churchwide levels.

- Synod Vice President: Ms. Molly Berry
- Synod Council Members: Mr. David Poland and Ms. Cassie Roach
- Male rostered ministers nominated to the 2025 ELCA Churchwide Assembly for election to the ELCA Church Council: the Revs. Ryan Anderson and Adam Dichsen
- Voting members to the 2025 ELCA Churchwide Assembly: Mr. Scott Dietrich, Mr. Christopher Edmonds, the Rev. Jon Fry, Ms. Bella Karunas, Ms. Sundae Johnson, the Rev. Julia Rademacher, and Ms. Ana Viera. They will join Bishop Busboom and Ms. Molly Berry, who serve ex officio.

Voting members approved the synod's 2025 budget of \$1,230,000. Of that, \$578,100 (47%) will be directed to the ELCA for ministry at the churchwide level, with \$651,900 (53%) to be used by the synod.

Festival Worship

A moving Festival Worship Service was held on the evening of June 6, hosted by Central Christian Church, Decatur. Mr. Tim Fink of Epiphany Lutheran Church, Carbondale, composed a new contemporary-style liturgy for this service, influenced by musical theater styles. The archived livestream can be viewed at YouTube.com/@csiselca.

We continued our tradition of using the Festival Worship offering to support the ministries of our companion synods in Madagascar — this year, we brought in over \$11,000! Individuals and congregations that still wish to contribute may give online at CSIS-ELCA.org/offering or send a check to the synod office.

Spirit Labs: Synod Visioning

The Assembly received the results of our synod-wide visioning surveys and listening sessions, which identify values, mission, vision, and emerging priorities. "Spirit Labs" breakout sessions were used to continue drilling down and identifying specifics that will shape our future as a synod.

Friday Evening BBQ & Hymnsing

Assembly members gathered at Holy Cross, Decatur, for a delicious catered meal of pork and beef barbecue sandwiches. We celebrated 20 years of our Synod-Authorized Ministry program with cake and a prayer of blessing for our SAMs. And we could not have a gathering of Lutherans without singing a few favorite hymns, old and new, led by Bishop Busboom on the keyboard with instrumentalists.

Our evening fellowship event concluded with pies thrown in the faces of the synod staff as part of the incentives for completing the synod-wide survey. Assembly attendees submitted their names for a drawing to be the piethrowers. Deacon Jason Fisher took a pie straight to the face, while Pastor Amy Ziettlow was "reminded of her baptism" with her pie; in addition to the pie with his name on it, Bishop Busboom received a double-whammy with his own pie and the remains of Pastor Amy's pie.

2025 Assembly

The 2025 Central/Southern Illinois Synod Assembly will be held June 5-7 at St. John's Lutheran Church, Bloomington.

Properties Committee (update)

- 1. The replacement fence for the back of the church has been ordered and should be installed by mid-July.
- 2. The exterior doors by the altar are slated to be adjusted and weather-stripping replaced to prevent water from entering.
- 3. We are getting quotes on replacing the front entrance doors.
- 4. The HVAC in the Office/Narthex area has not been keeping up, lately. A tech will be out to inspect the week of June 24th.
- 5. The chairs in Young Hall are losing the little black rubber stops that keep the chairs from hitting when stacked. If you find any, please give them to us.
- 6. Weeding, trimming, picking up sticks and spraying weed killer on the parking lot continues.
- 7. There were a couple of roofing shingles and some fascia replaced in June.

Tech Team (update)

In the June 2024 issue of The Resurrectionist, there was an article dealing with the Wi-Fi at the church. With the installation of our new A/V system came some growing pains. There are 2 Wi-Fi networks at RLC. One is the Main network, and the other is the Guest network. Among other things, our new A/V system uses our Main network to broadcast the audio portion to those attending our services that use listening devices connected to their phones.

By researching this, we have found that newer cellular phones can "hide" their MAC address (used to identify/allow access to the device on a network). A typical MAC address looks like "af:18:d6:cd:47:3d" and is a unique hexadecimal set of characters. These cell phones can send a Private (or fake) MAC address so the phone cannot be tracked. During the recent car show, there were 10 "unknown" phones connected to our Main network. There are security reasons why we do not want everyone connected to the Main network.

I Under Council's approval, I have started blocking these "unknown" phones. If you find you cannot access the Internet while at Resurrection, please check that you are on the Guest network (name: ATT360-Guest and password: voTe2019). If you have trouble, just want someone to set this up for you, or feel you need access to the Main network, contact a member of the Tech team for assistance. I believe we can achieve a secure environment for our digital records without much trouble. Then we can proclaim SUCCESS!
