

Mission

Responding to the Gospel, Lutheran Social Services of Illinois (LSSI) brings healing, justice, and wholeness to people and communities.

Vision

LSSI strives to bring dignity, health and well-being, and the promise of reaching one's full potential to the children, adults, and seniors we serve.





This Impact Statement encapsulates our progress in Fiscal Year 2024 through updates on LSSI programs and news of the clients we served.



Foster Care Services

Every child deserves a nurturing, welcoming, loving home. LSSI's Foster Care Program continually seeks to improve services. Our goal: to help children find their forever homeswhenever possible-either through reunification, adoption, or guardianship. As the largest private provider of foster care services in Illinois, LSSI trains and supports foster parents who welcome children who have been removed from their birth families due to abuse and/or neglect. LSSI provides licensing for foster parents and services in 12 offices covering 42 counties in Illinois.

2,647 children were served through foster care

Therapeutic Foster Care

LSSI provides Therapeutic Foster Care (TFC) for children experiencing severe trauma and those with emotional/behavioral issues. This evidence-based treatment is in single-family homes in Aurora, Chicago, and Rockford, rather than institutional settings. Of the children discharged from the program last year, 100% successfully completed their treatment and joined their planned aftercare families.



"Children in foster care are worthy of our investment because they are our future. If we intervene sooner, we can help prevent some of these longer-term issues and struggles. If we can generationally improve it, we are changing the course of a family."

Mental Health Services

Good mental health can positively impact every aspect of one's life. To serve the mental health and substance use needs of clients on Chicago's Northwest Side, LSSI offers case management, mental health service, peer supports, family support, counseling services, integrated healthcare, and crisis services through its Portage Cragin Counseling Center, a Certified Community Behavioral Health Clinic (CCBHC). LSSI's five Project IMPACT sites and Welcoming Center, serving Chicago and nearby suburbs, also provided mental health services.

LSSI provided critical mental health services to 17,096* clients. *11% more than 2023

Alcohol and Drug Treatment

Alcohol and drug use can have devastating effects on one's life. LSSI offers a full continuum of treatment for those with substance use disorders. Services include DUI Counseling and Education, Healthy Start Recovery Homes, Inpatient Rehabilitation, Outpatient Substance Use Treatment, and Sober Living. These services are offered in Chicago, Elgin, and Sterling.

LSSI served 2,503 clients with a substance use disorder.



Prisoner and Family Ministry

LSSI offers support and hope to people who are incarcerated and those who have recently reentered the community. Programs include Visits to Mom, the Storybook Project, and reentry services.

LSSI served 595 individuals and families impacted by incarceration.

Intact Family Services

When a family has come to the attention of the Illinois Department of Children and Family Services, Intact Family Services works to help stabilize, improve, and preserve family life, enabling children to remain safely at home.

1,318 families were enrolled in this program last year.

Affordable Housing

Having a home is a basic human need. LSSI offers affordable housing to those 62+ and people over age 18 with disabilities at 20 sites throughout the state. LSSI Social Service Coordinators are available at each site.

1,403 residents with an annual income between \$5,000 and \$25,000 were provided affordable housing by LSSI.



People with Developmental Disabilities

LSSI helps adults (18+) with intellectual/developmental disabilities live successfully in their communities, whether residential or community-based.

LSSI served 130 clients with developmental disabilities.

Intouch Home Care Services

Intouch Home Care Services promote independence and well-being for older adults and are tailored to the unique needs of each individual. Offered in Cook County, these services include personal care, transitional care, memory care, companion care, and more.



Book Club

Debra Spaul is the discussion leader for May 8th. Her book choice is <u>Hillbilly Elegy</u> by J.D. Vance. The book is available through the library and the movie can also be viewed on Netflix.

Summary: A passionate and personal analysis of a culture in crisis - that of white working-class Americans, a demographic of our country that has been slowly disintegrating over forty years. J. D. Vance tells the true story of what a social, regional, and class decline feels like when you were born with it hung around your neck. J. D. Vance's grandparents moved north from Kentucky's Appalachia region to Ohio in the hopes of escaping the dreadful poverty around them. They raised a middle-class family, and eventually their grandchild (the author) would graduate from Yale Law School, a conventional marker of their success in achieving generational upward mobility. Vance's grandparents, aunt, uncle, sister, and, most of all, his mother, struggled profoundly with the demands of their new middle-class life, and were never able to fully escape the legacy of abuse, alcoholism, poverty, and trauma. The story of how upward mobility really feels, and is a meditation on the loss of the American dream for a large segment of this country.





I Jody Kluender will be the discussion leader for **June 12th** meeting, and her book choice is <u>The First Ladies</u>
I by Marie Benedict & Victoria Christopher Murray. The book is available through the library.

Summary: The daughter of formerly enslaved parents, Mary McLeod Bethune refuses to back down as white supremacists attempt to thwart her work. She marches on as an activist and an educator, and as her reputation grows, she becomes a celebrity, revered by titans of business and recognized by U.S. Presidents. Eleanor Roosevelt herself is awestruck and eager to make her acquaintance. Initially drawn together because of their shared belief in women's rights and the power of education, Mary and Eleanor become fast friends confiding their secrets, hopes and dreams-and holding each other's hands through personal and professional strife. When Franklin Delano Roosevelt is elected president, the two women begin to collaborate more closely, particularly as Eleanor moves toward her own agenda separate from FDR, a consequence of the devastating discovery of her husband's secret love affair. Eleanor becomes a controversial First Lady for her outspokenness, particularly on civil rights. And when she receives threats because of her strong ties to Mary, it only fuels the women's desire to fight together for justice and equality.



Anyone wishing to attend our group meetings is certainly welcome. You know the dates and time, just show up and join in the fellowship, fun and laughter of the evening.
