# Men's Club-Local Disaster Support

HELP, HELP.....WATER!!!

May 16, an F3 tornado hit the Central and Northern districts of St. Louis City. The tornado was on the ground for nearly 23 miles, eventually crossing into Illinois. Seven people lost their lives and over 5000 buildings were damaged. Power, water, gas, and the ability to navigate through streets did not exist, still presenting issues in many of the neighborhoods hit. Presently, homeowners are trying to stay on premises to protect their belongings and salvage what property they can find.

On Monday, May 19, local TV stations were asking for help for victims and emphasized the need for drinking water. Several members of Resurrection's Men's Club, following guidance from the Lord, agreed to help. A call went out to the Salvation Army Disaster Relief, St. Louis Division. Martin Rueter, Division Director, was more than thankful of the idea of providing water to victims.

On Tuesday, May 20, four RLC Men's Club Members took on the task. Seven local retail businesses were contacted, and 1/3 of them donated, two members bought 1/3 and the Men's Club purchased the remaining 1/3 of 175-24 bottle cases of water. This equates to 7700 lbs. of water that were loaded in an 18-foot trailer. By Tuesday afternoon the water arrived in St. Louis at the Salvation Army Disaster Warehouse. It was learned that St. Louis city water locations would not be operating until May 23. Thus, RLC water came at a time of great need.



The acknowledgement of the need, acquisition of water, and delivery to help was all possible by the Lord's direction.

# **Social Ministry**

Not everyone who faces food insecurity simply needs food. Food insecurity can mean a household is experiencing challenges paying for food, medicine, housing, childcare, transportation, or utility bills. Simply providing food isn't always the solution. We learned from the April Community Health and Resource Fair about several Madison County programs available that offer support to individuals and families facing life circumstances that may require short-term help. Seniors who never dreamed their well-planned financial futures would be depleted due to unforeseen medical costs, are more and more frequently looking to government programs for assistance.

Food Pantries don't just help people with food. They work together with partner organizations and government agencies to assist with everything from obtaining gently used clothing, personal care items, completing SNAP applications and accessing Medicaid resources. The budget reconciliation bill passed by the House in May 2024 cut \$290 billion from the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP). These funding cuts greatly affect the ability of the 42 million people who rely on SNAP to feed themselves and their families. The bill is now with the Senate.

Resurrection Church has proclaimed God's glory in the community by being a generous supporter of the Alton Crisis Food Center with both non-perishable food items and seasonal vegetables from the Community Garden. As a reminder, the Center also has a store for people needing gently used clothing and household items. *Men's clothing; especially shoes, socks, and sweatshirts, are appreciated by our unhoused neighbors*.

Food suggestions for June: Peanut Butter, Canned Tuna / Chicken (flip top lid), Olive or Canola Oil, Honey, Canned Beans

Food donations can be left in the designated blue barrel in the narthex. Other marked items for the store can be left in the coat closet for a volunteer to deliver. You can also deliver directly to the Center at

### **Community Garden**

A new flower bed south of the Community Garden was added to supplement the vegetables. Native plants were intentionally selected to help with pollination for the vegetables and encourage biodiversity. The flowers will not only add beauty to the site but will help promote a steady population of beneficial insects. Birds eat insects, and having a bird-friendly garden will hopefully help control pests. Many birds, including the declining number of songbirds, love slugs as do many beneficial soil organisms. By adding flowers we also want to attract butterflies who need native habitat.

Seasonal blooms will be included for distribution with the produce at the Crisis Food Center and the Oasis Women's Center to brighten the spirits of anyone receiving a colorful bouquet. Emotional well-being is an important factor in physical health, one of the multiple goals of the Community Garden. Flowers will also be shared with our members receiving homebound communion. The Community Garden Team welcomes any donations of vases or containers to place cut flowers in for delivery. Help us proclaim God's beauty through nature!

#### **REPORTS**

- \* Treasurer's Report: Total offering for the month was \$11,499.41. Total income for the month was \$12,083.89. Total expenses were \$13,406.34. The cash flow balance for the month was \$-1,319.45.
- \* President's Report: Discussion on property committee repairs/concerns were addressed.

#### \* Pastor's Report:

- Life Long Learners will begin a new study following Memorial Day weekend on other denominations.
- PI Team will end work on the brochures and continue with Outreach. They will also begin discussing Committee Structures and staffing. New brochure racks are in the making as well.
- Pastor will be away for two weeks in June.
- Pastor and the Tillmans will attend the Synod Assembly June 5-7 in Bloomington. Worship will be livestreamed on the Synod's YouTube channel.
- Pastor is very pleased with our continued outreach and evangelism efforts as well as the increase in participation in these efforts.

#### **I COMMITTEE REPORTS**

- \* Property— Contacting landscape companies has been placed on hold as we continue to test the new black drainage pipes placed above ground on both corners of the sanctuary. An issue with the faucet at the hand washing station in the kitchen will be looked at/addressed. A purchase of the specialized lightbulbs used throughout the sanctuary will be made. We have no spares at this time and plan on ordering a decent supply of each kind.
- \* Men's Club—The Swap Meet was a success with 15 vendors, about 200 visitors, \$150 in food sales and \$300 in fees collected. Another Trivia Nite is in the works for June 20th at 6:30 pm. The entry fee is \$5 or 5 can goods for the Alton Food Bank. The Cars and Coffee shows are coming up on July 12th and September 13th. The Men's Club has also cleaned out the Young Hall closet, old classroom and the out building. The spaces look the best they have in years!!!

#### **NEW BUSINESS**

- \* A motion was made and passed to donate \$200 to Pedal For a Purpose, to show our support of Sam and Stephanie Tillman who are Active in campus ministry at the University of Illinois.
- \* A motion was made and passed to donate \$200 to Malagasy Lutheran Church, Madagascar. This is where the offerings from this year's Synod Assembly will be donated.

#### **CONTINUTING BUSINESS**

\* Neal has purchased a new laptop for him and Kay to facilitate for church related duties. The laptop is currently being setup. Neal is also working on resecuring various church accounts to current users only.



# **Book Club**

Jody Kluender will be the discussion leader for **June 12th** meeting, and her book choice is <u>The First Ladies</u> by Marie Benedict & Victoria Christopher Murray. The book is available through the library.

Summary: The daughter of formerly enslaved parents, Mary McLeod Bethune refuses to back down as white supremacists attempt to thwart her work. She marches on as an activist and an educator, and as her reputation grows, she becomes a celebrity, revered by titans of business and recognized by U.S. Presidents. Eleanor Roosevelt herself is awestruck and eager to make her acquaintance. Initially drawn together because of their shared belief in women's rights and the power of education, Mary and Eleanor become fast friends confiding their secrets, hopes and dreams-and holding each other's hands through personal and professional strife. When Franklin Delano Roosevelt is elected president, the two women begin to collaborate more closely, particularly as Eleanor moves toward her own agenda separate from FDR, a consequence of the devastating discovery of her husband's secret love affair. Eleanor becomes a controversial First Lady for her outspokenness, particularly on civil rights. And when she receives threats because of her strong ties to Mary, it only fuels the women's desire to fight together for justice and equality.
