Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Thank you all for a wonderful, lovely potluck! Beautiful flowers, and A+ delicious food! Everything I had to eat was outstanding. I am still working through your shower of cards, messages and gift cards. I greatly appreciate the kindness and generosity you have shown me. I plan to gather all of the cards and bind them into a hardbound book which I will treasure. This book will be a constant reminder to me of you and of the honor and privilege that it is for me to serve with you at Resurrection.

Sunday Morning 9:00 A.M. **Lifelong Learners** completed a short review of early church history. To-day (July 27) we began a two-part study of Roman Catholicism which we will finish next Sunday. In the session today and during the review of early church history, we had lots of questions, in particular about hell. So, August 10, we will begin a 2-part study of hell. The Title is "**Exploring Hell**." We'll discover that the origins of belief in hell are as old as human civilization and have evolved over time. Our beliefs about hell are varied and still emerging. It's interesting that a belief in hell is common to many other religions, though the term "hell" may not always be used to name the place, the belief that such a place does exist is common. What sets Christianity apart from other religions is our belief that one is consigned to hell for eternity. Other religions believe that over time, it is possible to escape hell. Have I piqued your curiosity? Join us August 10 to learn more. I do not promise that you will come away having learned all of the answers. You're most likely to have more questions when the study ends, and you will have lots to ponder as it relates to your own faith journey.

Also, August 10, after worship 2nd Sunday Lunch Bunch goes to eat at the Fountain Hill in Grafton. This is the former "Fin Inn," now owned and operated by the former owners of Santino's just up the street from us. The menu has expanded way beyond seafood (a big 'Yay' from me since I cannot eat fish or seafood). Dan and Carol Garner have eaten there and highly recommend it. Sign up at church if you'd like to come eat with us.


CPR & AED Training




Vera Schultze will be the discussion leader for our meeting on September 11th.

Highlight's from Church Council - June

REPORTS

* Treasurer's Report: Total offering for the month was \$14,329.50. Total income for the month was \$14,431.59. Total expenses were \$13,620.51. The cash flow balance for the month was \$811.08. We have a parishioner that pays quarterly, reflecting the increase in offering. Right now we also have mowing expenses of \$800-1,000 per month and rising electric bills due to summer rates and air conditioning. Our CDs (\$40,000) have earned us roughly \$1,300 in interest.

* Pastor's Report:

- Homebound Communion is currently down to two recipients.
- Pastor will be a speaker at the memorial for Rev. Dr. Fred Giruad on Aug. 9, 1pm.
- The Synod Interim Ministry training has moved to Sept. 16-17 in Springfield. Discover and Invite will be the topic discussed.
- Pastor is working on cleaning out her office and various file cabinets for storage of things such as our brochures and outreach materials.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

* Property— We will have to retract the statement about the above ground gutter pipes solving the water leaking into the sanctuary. On the week of 7/20 water came in with another heavy downpour. Council will start getting bids from landscapers reference the grading issues needing to be addressed to stop the flooding. Bob Doerr has been in contact with carpenter Richard Mosby regarding new entry doors. Richard Mosby has been to our church and given us a very reasonable verbal estimate. Bob will secure that in the form of a written estimate for council approval.

NEW BUSINESS

* Pipe organ— A few members, including Pastor and Russ have visited Lutheran Church of the Living Christ in Florissant, MO. They are disbanding. The building and contents are for sale, including a beautiful, hand-crafted Marin Ott pipe organ. Measurements have been taken and blue tape has been placed in our sanctuary for possible placement. Jody and Tony Kluender are doing the leg work on this project, to see if it's a viable option for us. Right now we have little to share. Costs to disassemble and reassemble the organ could be anywhere from \$5,000-30,000 depending on what's involved. The Kluender's are working with Wicks Organ Company who currently services it. Rich and Neal will need to speak to Output Unlimited in regards to upgrading our sound system with the capability to digitally record. We will update you as more pertinent information is gathered.
